

DISORDERS REPORTED IN ARMENIA

Russian Leaders Seen In Peaceful Mood At Bombay

BOMBAY, India (Reuters) — Russia's Nikita Khrushchev and Nikolai Bulganin petted "peace doves" and caressed baby chicks here Thursday while in New Delhi Andrei Gromyko conferred with Indian officials on Russia's offer to export atomic knowledge to India.

Khrushchev and Bulganin were greeted by 100,000 cheering children in a Bombay stadium. As they arrived, thousands of balloons and scores of doves were released.

A Russian woman in the party caught two of the birds and presented them to the two statesmen, who petted them for a time.

Says Russia Tears Aside Iron Curtain

BOMBAY, India (AP) — Nikita Khrushchev declared Thursday that Russia has torn aside the so-called Iron Curtain. "No one who applied for permission to enter the Soviet Union was refused a visa this year," he said.

The Soviet Communist party chief challenged other countries to open their frontiers — "as we have" — in a speech before the Indian-Soviet Cultural Society, concluding the Russian leaders' visit to Bombay.

Blame Riot On Football Game

MOSCOW, (AP) — The supreme court of the Armenian Soviet Republic has sentenced 12 persons to jail terms ranging up to 25 years following a riot which broke out after a disputed decision in a football game at Yerevan, the republican capital.

The disputed decision apparently touched off smouldering discontent which has been below the surface for some time in Armenia.

There is nothing unusual in disturbances following a sporting event in the Soviet Union any more than there is in Western countries, but such severe sentences, such publicity and appearances before a supreme court are unusual in the extreme. Experienced observers in Moscow doubted that any such sentences would have occurred if there had not been political motivation in the action at the football field.

This belief was reinforced by the fact that six persons were executed for counter-revolutionary activities just before this in the neighboring republic of Georgia and 3,000 persons expelled from the Communist party of the Georgian Republic. The newspaper Kommunist reaching here Thursday reported the disorders in Yerevan and said they were set off by "hooligans and criminals."

Under the heading "In the Supreme Court of the Armenian Republic," the Armenian newspaper said: "In the collegium of the Supreme Court of the Armenian Republic there has finished the consideration of the criminal case of the accusation against a group of instigators of disorders which took place on Oct. 15 of this year in the republican stadium."

TRY 12 PERSONS
"Twelve people were tried. Numerous representatives of workers, employers and students were present in the courtroom. They said that on the day when a football match took place for the Class D championship of the Soviet Union groups of hooligans and criminals using dissatisfaction of a part of the crowd at the result of the game, started riots."

The disorders were accompanied by attempts to lynch the referee of the football game. The riot was accompanied by violence and resistance to the representatives of authority.

Kommunist said, "one person threw a stone against a militiaman and wounded him and when the militia tried to arrest him he resisted stubbornly and tried to escape but was caught. There were other examples of violence and resistance to authority."

"Another group of hooligans threw stones and other objects into the midst of other citizens and militiamen who were at the stadium."

CRIMINAL ELEMENT
"Nine of the 12 persons who were brought to court were from the criminal element of the population who had been in court before and released. The collegium, finding all the accusations true, condemned four people to 25 years in prison and one to 20 years. Two were sentenced to 15 years, three to 10 years, one to two years and one to one year."

Sports match disorders are rather usual things even in the capital city of Moscow.

Stormy Debate On Israel In U. K. Commons
LONDON, (AP) — Prime Minister Eden Thursday pressed Arabs and Jews to accept his plan for a Palestine peace amid stormy protests by opposition Laborites that it would carve up Israel.

The British leader told the House of Commons his government and he personally still stand ready to mediate in the seven-year-long dispute that threatens the uneasy peace of the Middle East. He claimed he had the full support of the U. S. government in his quest for a settlement.

This was all a prelude to the president's posing a carving knife over a 40-pound turkey at a festive table set for nine Eisenhoweres.
