with a single governing body, with a majority of members from the university committee. (I was also in favor of students on the governing body.)

In the event, the committee that drafted the University Act, made up of students and faculty from Prince of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University, was not in favor of one governing body; and the government accepted its recommendations almost without change.

In general, I am still in favor of one governing body, but I also think that it would be sensible now to see how the system does work at the university of Toronto and the few other institutions that have adopted it.

I think that Mr. MacRae should be careful about using political analogies for the government of a university. If he really wants a governing system that is "good enough for the governments of the ten provinces," he might consider that that would mean a governing body elected entirely by the public. Students and faculty would of course

be free to stand for election but the public would also be free to elect a governing body for the University which had no students, faculty, or indeed anyone with the interests of the University at heart on it.

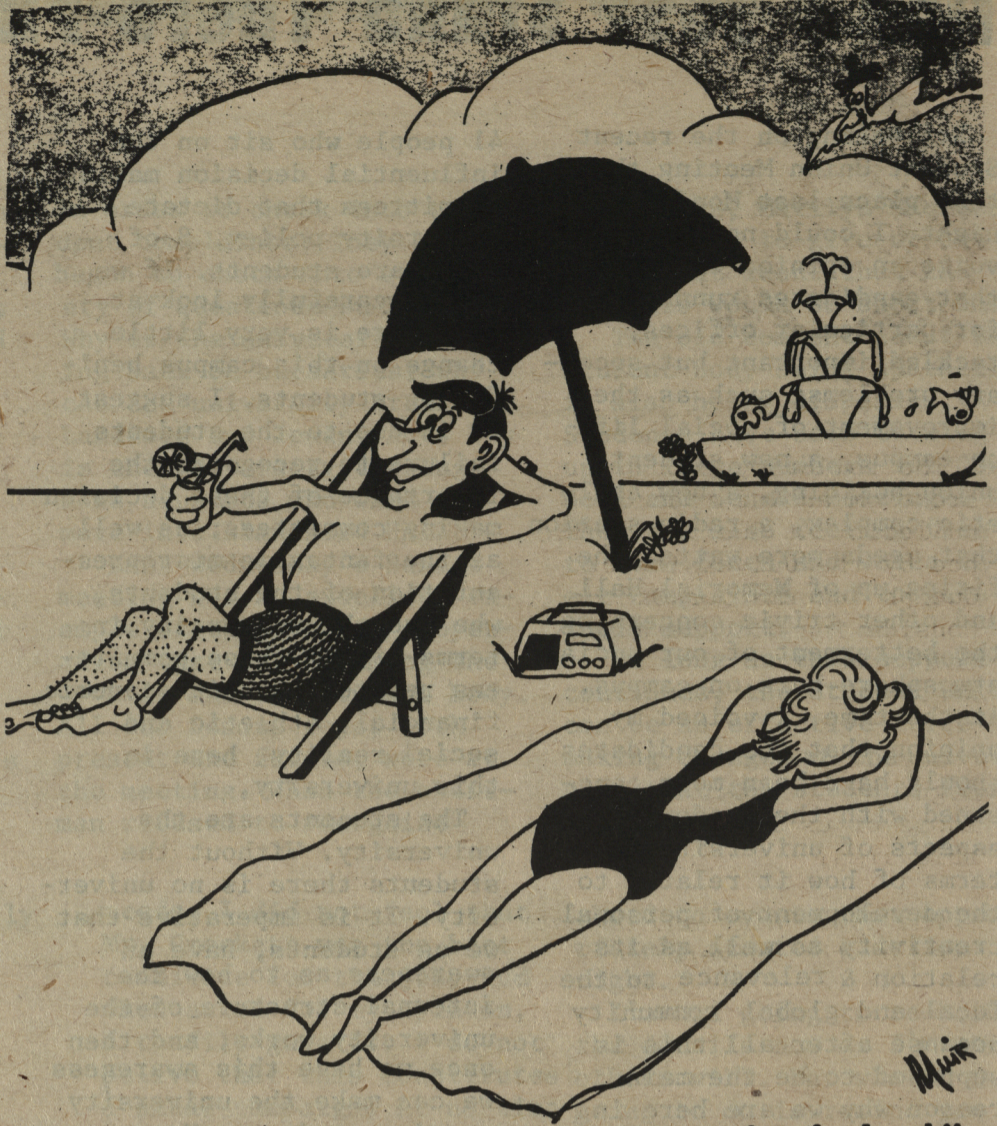
