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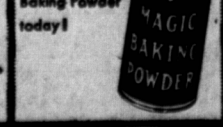
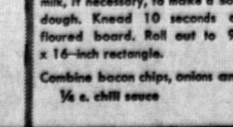

Fry together, then drain well 8 slices cut-up side bacon 1/2 cup finely-chopped onion Sift together once, then into bowl 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour 4 tsp. Magic Baking Powder 1/2 tsp. salt few grains cayenne

Cut in finely 1/4 c. chilled shortening Mix in 3/4 c. shredded cheddar cheese 3 tbsps. finely-chopped parsley Make well in dry ingredients; add 3/4 c. milk and mix lightly with a fork, adding milk, if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead 10 seconds on floured board. Roll out to 9- x 16-inch rectangle. Combine bacon chips, onion and 1/4 c. chill sauce

Spread on dough, beginning at a long edge, roll up jelly-roll fashion. Bring ends together to form a ring; seal. Press on ungreased cookie sheet. Cut 1-inch slices almost through to centre with scissors; turn each slice partly on its side. Bake in a hot oven, 450°, 15 to 20 minutes. Yield: 1 ring.

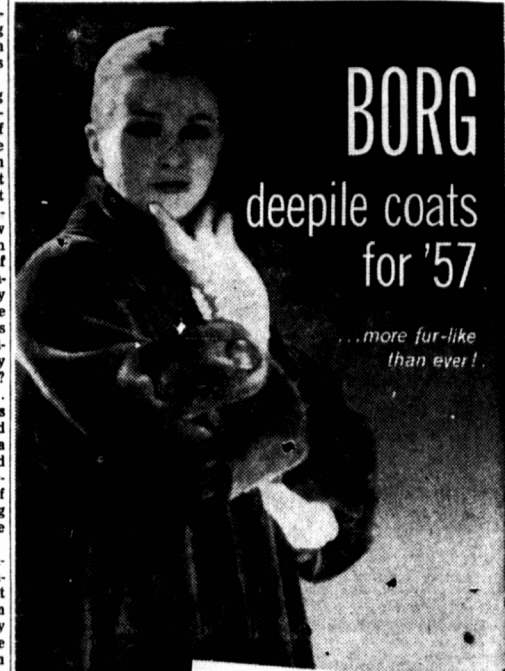
