

Cease-Fire Ends 22 Years Continuous War For France

PARIS (AP) — Monday's cease-fire ending the Algerian Nationalist rebellion came after 22 years of almost continuous warfare for France.

Between France's declaration of war against Nazi aggression on Sept. 3, 1939, and the Algerian cease-fire, France enjoyed only 102 days of peace. This was the gap between the end of the fighting in her Indochina colonies and Nov. 1, 1954, the date of the first organized raids by the Algerian rebels.

On the morning of Nov. 1 several hundred Algerians with hunting rifles started raids in the Aures Mountains of eastern Algeria and at more than 20 other points on Algerian territory.

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Opposed Views Are Given On Medical Care Proposal

OTTAWA (CP)—Two powerful national organizations presented diametrically opposed views before the Hall royal commission on health services on whether Canada should have a compulsory, government-controlled medical care plan.

The Canadian Chamber of Commerce held that government financial assistance should be directed only to helping those now unable to pay their doctor bills. It appealed to the seven-member commission to oppose "socialized medicine."

Early in 1957, as the rebellion continued reeling in Algeria, Brig. Gen. Jacques Massu was sent into the Casbah of Algiers to clean out the "nest" of agitators. His tactics gave rise to charges of prisoner tortures, some of which were confirmed.

May 13, 1958, marked the beginning of the end for the Fourth Republic and cleared the way for de Gaulle's return from political limbo.

FORGES AHEAD
De Gaulle pushed through a new constitution giving him virtually dictatorial powers and reluctantly forged ahead with plans to give Algeria self-determination.

In January, 1960, the European settlers made a desperate try to unseat him. But de Gaulle crumbled their street barricades with a stern call to order in a radio-television address.

De Gaulle attempted what no other French leader before him dared—publicly announced negotiations with the rebel leaders. The talks failed but de Gaulle remained in power.

The president then went to the country and received an overwhelming "oui" vote for his Algerian program.

Once more in Algeria rose against de Gaulle. The April 1961 pulse of the generals was quickly snuffed out and de Gaulle sent his negotiators for more talks that finally cleared the way for a cease-fire.

Cubans Begin Food Rationing

HAVANA (AP)—Rationing of food has begun in Cuba, a week after Premier Fidel Castro went on television to announce the unpleasant measure to his people.

The ration booklets necessary to obtain food, soap, detergents and toiletries have not been received or picked up by all families and it was difficult to determine how smoothly the rationing would function.

Revolution, the only newspaper published here Monday mornings, gave prominent space to explanations about the rationing.

It said milk rationing would not start until next week. From then on each child under 7 will be allotted a litre (about a quart) a day with an additional litre for each family of five adults.

Meat will be sold twice a week only. Each person is allowed three-quarters of a pound a week. Seven ounces will be of prime grade and the rest of second grade. Revolution said.

Prairie Manager Named By CNR

WINNIPEG (CP) — The appointment of Norman T. Walton as general manager of the Canadian National Railways prairie region was announced here by D.V. Gonder, vice-president of the region.

Mr. Walton will succeed E. J. Cooke who takes over a similar position in the Atlantic region at Montreal, N.B. The appointments are effective April 1.

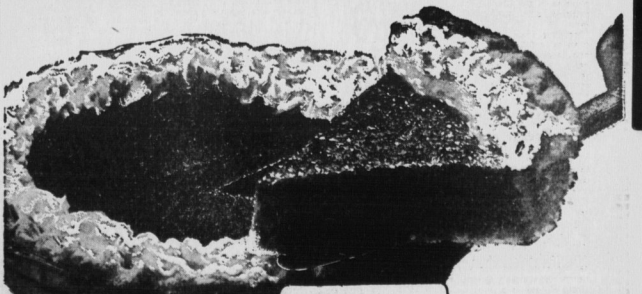
16th Defector Is Identified

OTTAWA (CP) — The 16th Cuban to defect at Newfoundland's Gander Airport and seek admission to the United States has been identified here as 36-year-old Carlos Manuel Diaz Fernandez.

Fernandez was the co-pilot of a Cubana Airlines plane which landed at Gander Sunday night on a flight from Havana to Prague. He asked Canadian immigration officials for transit privileges to enable him to apply to American authorities for a visa to enter the U.S.

The 15 other Cubans who defected earlier at Gander all were successful in obtaining American visas.

YOU CAN bake a pumpkin pie!...and what a PUMPKIN PIE!



Perfection PUMPKIN PIE

2 1/2 cups pumpkin puree (fresh or canned)	2 tsp. cinnamon
4 eggs	1/4 tsp. mace
1 1/2 cups brown sugar (firmly packed)	2 lbs. boiling water
1/4 cup PERFECTION EVAPORATED MILK	1/4 cup orange juice
1-1/2 tsp. ground ginger	1 tsp. salt
	2 chilled unbaked, unpricked pie shells

Put pumpkin in aluminum saucepan, stir over direct heat till somewhat dried out, with slightly caramelized appearance. (10 min.) Keep hot. Beat eggs in mixing bowl, blend in sugar, add PERFECTION EVAPORATED MILK and spices previously mixed to a paste with boiling water. Stir well. Add pumpkin, orange juice, salt. Stir well. Pour instantly into pastry shells. Bake in 350° F. oven 25-30 minutes. Only an inch in centre of filling remains liquid. Remove to cake rack and cool. 2 pies.

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
