

Timely Advice.

ONE of the anti-Confederate politicians of Nova Scotia has recently written a letter to the Toronto Globe, setting forth in Grit style, pure and simple, the hard times and local grievances of his native Province.

We regret to hear from our Nova Scotia correspondent so unfavorable an account of his Province as is minutely set forth in his letter. There is nothing, however, in his statements which convinces us that the feeling in favor of repeal is other than a mere incident of the hard times.

Nova Scotian political discontent will disappear with the return of better times, which are evidently at hand. The exodus which our correspondent deplures shows that the process of assimilating Canadian and American wages and profits is rapidly going on.

The Reform press has called attention to the late exodus, not to show that the people are driven away by the N. P., but to show that the N. P. failed to keep them in the country.

Reports of the Canadian Crop. The Toronto Globe, of the 7th, reports the crop prospects of all parts of Canada. The condition of the crops is represented by numbers, 100 being the figure for an average crop; 10 per cent. is added when the crop is above average, and vice versa.

As to the fall wheat there are 303 reports in which figures are used, and the average condition, according to these reports, is 94. There seems to be a small increase in the acreage under this crop, which will bring its yield up to an average.

The other spring grains are evidently going to yield bountifully. The condition of barley as evidenced by 319 reports is 103. Oats promises a yield of 111, according to the average of 320 reports.

such as it is worth the average of 284 reports shows a condition of 104.

This is the bearing year of most of our apple orchards, and accordingly the summary of 284 reports represents the crop promising a yield of 106. The yield of "other fruits" has been, or is likely to be abundant also. According to 281 reports the condition of "other fruits" than apples is 104.

A few special crops are mentioned here and there in the reports. According to them, peaches will be a very good crop, flax one of the best on record, there being also an increased acreage under the crop, and hops a condition of 80.

The crops in the Maritime Provinces promise an excellent yield, and all accounts agree that the cultivation of wheat has increased largely there during the year.

The report from Manitoba and the North-West shows that the acreage under all kinds of crops has been very much increased, and that a bountiful yield of all kinds of produce may be expected.
