The Oppositor's Policy on the Fishery Question.

LAURIER'S REPLY, AND SIR JOHN'S BRILLIANT RETORT.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.

For some days, the Opposition has been preparing a bomb-shell, to destroy the Government. It was supposed that Sir Richard Cartwright would lead the attack, but yesterday afternoon surprises were met at rest, when Mr. Laurier, at 3:40 o'clock p. m., arose and began his attack.

This, then, is the policy of the opposition. Give to the Americans all they claim. Eat humble pie and say that Canada has been all wrong in her contentions.

Sir John, when he arose to reply, looked remarkably well. His form was as animated as that of a young man. His scathing sarcasms on the contention of Mr. Laurier, that Canada was ill-using the 60,000,000 of people in the United States, were given with an irresistible comicality of countenance that convulsed the House with laughter.

In connection with the *modus vivendi*, he pointed out that Newfoundland was joined with the Dominion in continuing or discontinuing that system; and he was glad to announce to the House and the country that that colony heartily approved of the policy pursued by the Dominion.

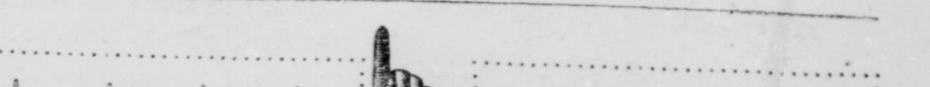
