

Eight Restrictions on Island Said Severe

The impact on island economy of government-imposed traffic restrictions on highway trucks was noted by a group of the larger trucking companies in the province.

Spokesmen for the group stated that approximately 20 more were immediately threatened with loss of their jobs, and at least 100 were indirectly affected.

Until the Communist menace is removed from Europe, NATO should continue to be supported by both Britain and the U.S. Until the advent of an effective world police, Canada and the U.S. must play their parts in preserving the peace of the world, but Britain will, I hope, act as a member of the Commonwealth, using Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the Asiatic dominions taking their share.

Preferably through the United Nations, Britain and the U.S. should take the lead, with the other states with an advanced economy, in raising the standard of life in less advanced countries and in helping them in particular by technical and administrative personnel.

I do not look forward to an intense economic rivalry.

Unless the Common Market countries embark on a narrow protectionism, both the U.S. and Britain should move towards freer trade and in particular to develop new markets by increasing the purchasing power of that half of the human race which is still poverty-stricken.

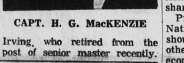

dominant theme of the first half of the 20th century has been the cooperation of the United States and Britain.

In two great ways this alliance was the decisive factor in ending Europe and perhaps the world from the domination of Germany.

After the Second World War it stopped the hegemony of Japan in the southern and far eastern parts of Asia.

In the postwar period, by intervention on behalf of the United States, the working of Communist aggression in the east in Korea and by the airlift to Europe, the same services to Europe.

Today the joint development of atomic weapons by the same two powers maintains the peace of the world in uneasy calm.

I had the privilege, as a member of the war cabinet, of close cooperation between the U.S. and Britain—rather, as prime minister, of working with a LOOK AHEAD

It is, I think, of value to consider the future of Anglo-American relations.

It is clear that the interests not only of Britain and the United States, but also of the world, that close cooperation between the U.S. and Britain—rather, I would say, the British Commonwealth of nations—is of the first importance.

I altogether reject the conception that Britain is just a small off-shore island part of Europe. This has never been the position of Britain since discovery of the new world.

Her proximity to Europe is a fact and she has never been indifferent to European affairs, but she has never sought to be
