Strange But True

H. G. Mellick, of Paris, Ontario, wasn't surprised when his Holstein cow had twins last week. He would have been more surprised if she hadn't. In the past 25 months this cow has calved three times and produced 7 calves. The first time she had triplets, but since then has contented herself with mere twins. All calves have been healthy.

Just in case you are interested in bossy's routine, here it is: A cow eats about 125 lbs. of 5-inch high forage a day, which should produce 50 lb. of 3-5 percent milk. The grass is cut two to three feet in height, she eats 45 lb. day. Bossy grazes approximately seven and a half hours per day, regardless of how much feed she gets. 60 percent of her grazing goes on during daylight hours and 40 percent at night, with 50 to 70 bites per hour.

She spends 12 hours a day lying down at nine different times and chews her cud on the average of seven hours. She travels 2 1/4 miles every day for food and 1 1/2 every night. It takes ten stiff drinks every 24 hours to slake her thirst. She has lunch by her owner Bossy must get along on what she eats during the 7 1/2 hours of grazing, whether it be 40 lb. or 125 lb. These figures concerning Bossy's personal habits were set down by the University of California Agriculture Extension Service and go to show to what ends some people will go to get data.

No Trace Of Missing Plane

REO DE JANTHERO, May 1 (AP)—Search planes scouted some 320,000 square miles of jungle and plateau land Wednesday for a Pan American luxury stratoscouter that disappeared Tuesday with 50 persons, including a crew of nine.

Among the 41 passengers were the sister of a Canadian Government official and the president of the Willys-Overland Auto Export Company of Canada, Ltd., Mrs. Lucy Gels Wood, 37, formerly of Montreal, and her husband, John Vincent Wood, 47, a British engineer, were among the missing. Mrs. Wood is the sister of Edmond Joly de Lotbiniere of the Canadian External Affairs Department.

The auto official was Marcel Francois DeMuelier 50, of Toledo. Two other passengers with Canadian connections were Dagmar Seelig, 24, a German citizen living in Montreal, and Lockett Coleman of Boston, a grandson of the late Chief Justice Charles Piers Davidson of Quebec.

Sherritt Gordon Mines Show Profit

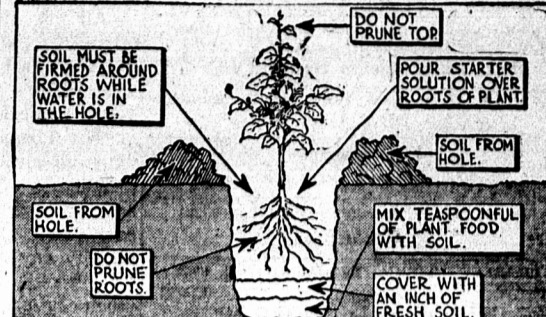
TORONTO, May 1 (CP)—Sherritt Gordon Mines, Ltd., the big Manitoba property which is moving itself 120 miles north to a new location, made a record profit in its final year on its old site.

Net profit for 1951, the annual report shows, was \$1,611,912, an increase of \$211,006 over 1950.

The now-closed mine at Sherridon, Man., was a copper-zinc-silver-gold operation. The new mine, at Lynn Lake, in Northern Manitoba, is a nickel-copper-cobalt property which involves the building of a nickel refinery near Edmonton.

Plants Grow Faster When Moved This Scientific Way



Latest Transplanting Methods Approved by Experimental Stations

When the danger of frost is over, garden plants which have been started under protection can be moved to the garden. By using methods which have been developed by research, amateurs willing to take care can start plants growing in their new homes with a minimum of shock, without wilting, and without losses.

In the diagram above, the best methods of procedure as recommended by research scientists are illustrated. Transplanting is horticultural surgery, and so every step in this technique has been carefully tested. To prepare for transplanting the plants should be fed with liquid plant food a week before the operation. The day before, a starter solution should be prepared, by hanging a cloth bag containing chemical plant food in a bucket of water and letting it soak overnight. Use 4 ounces of a 4-1-4 mixture or similar to each gallon of water.

Make a hole for the plant large and deep enough to hold its roots without crowding. Mix with soil at the bottom a teaspoonful of plant food and cover this with soil. Set the plant in place, then pour into the hole, over the plant roots, 1-2 pint of starter solution.

While the solution is in the hole, draw in the loose soil and firm it around the plant. The solution not only supplies nutrients but puddles the soil about the roots, making very close contact between soil and root and making it easy for the plant to take up water. Roots of plants should not be pruned. In removing plants from pots, flats or seed beds, care should be taken to avoid breaking the root system. Replacement of lost roots must take place before the plant can grow very much.

Shading is good practice when plants are succulent, when soil and air are dry and when sun is hot. But good plants can usually be set successfully without shade, especially if water or starter solution is used or if good contact between soil and root is established otherwise.
