

Night Shopping Trend Now Affecting Banks

The effects of night shopping, which allows Mom and Pop to make up an evening buying team and perhaps bring along the kids, are spreading.

More and more stores, many of them originally opposed to the idea, are keeping their doors open, and now the chartered banks are taking a look at what is going on.

The banks have chosen selected spots in Ontario — six shopping centres in Metropolitan Toronto and one each in Hamilton and St. Catharines — and will extend their present late Friday hours from the present 4:30 p.m.-6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

"The step is experimental," a bank spokesman said. "to see whether there is a demand for banking services in the evening."

TRUST COMPANIES ACTIVE

The fact that trust companies also operate even longer hours in such areas, and are actively canvassing for savings, is also regarded as a factor.

No one appears too ready to comment upon how far the development might spread if the experiment shows that night banking services are popular. It could spread to night-banking downtown, where night shopping hours also are popular, and it could possibly result in staggering of present day-time hours. For the banks, a considerable staff problem is involved.

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Smallwood Has Complaint Fishermen's Aid No Good

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Premier Smallwood said here any complaints about federal assistance to Newfoundland fishermen pressed by poor catches, should be sent to Ottawa. He repeated earlier statements that the assistance program is no good.

In a prepared statement Mr. Smallwood said some people did not understand that the whole scheme "belongs to the federal government" and was denounced by the provincial government in the legislature.

The program involves a \$300,000 winter works program to aid fishermen who suffered a poor catch last year. Since the program started last month, several fishermen and fishermen's groups have complained the benefits were not going to needy fishermen.

Mr. Smallwood said federal government officials "came to St. John's from Ottawa and planned out the whole scheme. They decided what places along the seacoast should receive anything from the winter works program.

"They picked out the very settlements where this scheme would be carried out. They decided how much money would be sent to each individual settlement."

He said if town councils, local road boards or other organizations were not "spending the money from Ottawa in a way that satisfies the fishermen who need help, the thing for the fishermen to do is to complain to Ottawa."

Mr. Smallwood said he had written Prime Minister Diefenbaker that the scheme would not work and that ordinary winter works, were not the way to help the distressed fishermen.

"No attention was paid to what I wrote" and "the blame must rest on those who brought in this foolish plan," Mr. Smallwood said.
