## Leaving Accident Scene Brings Fine

SUMMERSIDE — Bruce Herbert McGregor was fined \$100 and costs in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday on a charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident in which the vehicle he was driving was involved. Magistrate Chester MacDonald presided.

Clarence Charles Waddell was fined \$75 and costs on an impaired driving charge, and paid \$20 on a second charge of unlawful possession of liquor.

Robert Montgomery Oland was fined \$75 and costs on an impaired driving charge, and other fines of \$20 were laid against John Vernon Johnson, Willis Ellsworth and Walter Clough for unlawful possession of liquor.

Norman Joseph Arsenault of Kings, who failed to appear in court following a summons, was fined \$10 and costs for driving his three ton truck with the following defects: one head light out, without rear lights, windshield wipers, clearance lights, signal lights, and having only one license plate and an emergency break that would not work.

Richard James Arsenault was fined \$10 and costs for driving a vehicle with the brakes not in good working condition and Lloyd Joseph Sark was fined \$10 for unlawful possession of liquor on an Indian Reserve.

The case of Arthur Shirley Agnew, charged with incest was adjourned until June 13. The accused was remanded until that time.

## HAS STUDENT CREDIT UNION

## S. Rustico's New School Officially Opens Thurs.

South Rustico's new St. Augustine School, which is to be officially opened Thursday, contains a unique organization in that it has the first students' credit union to be organized in the province.

At the official opening ceremonies, scheduled to begin at 2:30 Thursday afternoon, Education Minister George Dewar will cut the ceremonial ribbon. The guest speaker will be Professor J. H. Blanchard, Charlottetown. Commenting on the school's credit union, the principal, Sister Saint Marguerite Louise, said the union was formed in April and had about 20 members among the grades five to eight pupils; now, grades three and four have joined and the union has about 50 members.

"Operating a credit union has been wonderful experience for the student officers of the organization and has taught the members the value of regular saving — even if it is only a few cents a week. It is not the amount that counts, but that regular saving is encouraged."

## June Temperatures Down, Records Remain Unbroken

SUMMERSIDE — June has not set any record low temperatures in the Summerside area as some people have suggested — in fact P.E.I. had considerably warmer temperatures on at least one occasion than the other Maritime Provinces.

Actually the temperatures have been running about two degrees below normal for early June according to forecaster David Craig at the RCAF "met" section. Surprisingly enough the only record equaled this month was the high of 78 degrees on June 2nd.

Records show the weather has been much colder in June's of past years, the lowest ever recorded being a 53 degree mark on June 5, 1963, and in 1929 a temperature of 35 was registered as late as June 1st.

Forecaster Craig stated the temperature has never been below 40 degrees this month while at Truro, N.S., it dipped to 31 a few nights ago.

Mr. Craig stated that yesterday's winds peaked to 35 miles per hour around 4:00 p.m., but last only for a minute or so.

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## FISHERMEN HOPE TO TAKE TO SEA TODAY

Some damage to lobster traps is expected in the north shore areas after the high winds of the last few days but it is not expected to be too serious.

In the Alberton area offshore winds are not expected to cause damage. However, the traps may be shaken up and the lines tangled somewhat. The same holds true for the Souris area, but most fishermen feel that the traps closer to the shore in shallow water will be the only ones affected.

The actual result of the winds and choppy seas will not be known until later today when men will be able to take to the boats for the first time in several days. Rough seas have kept the boats on shore.

## New Program Seen As Aid To Province

Dr. George Dewar, commenting on several points of Labor Minister MacEachen's employment and manpower development program announced in the House of Commons yesterday, stated that the continuing of federal capital assistance at 75 per cent on technical training schools may mean that a great deal of the equipment for the new Provincial Vocational Institute will be obtained at only 25 per cent of the cost.

"Before it was decided to continue the assistance, we were out at the end of last March from receiving the 75 per cent from the federal government. I am sure the new arrangements will help a great deal," he said.

"Bill Favreham, Clay's manager, is the man who would sign up Clay for any such fight," Dundee said.

Favreham himself is in Louisville and said he had not been approached. He is expected Thursday for the fight between Clay and British champion Henry Cooper in London's open title bout.

But Dundee added: "I know this much—Clay would be only too happy to take on Liston."

Reports that Clay would fight Liston in Philadelphia came in a report from columnist Bud Collins in the Boston Herald.
