

SANTIAGO UNDER AMERICAN RULE.

General Shafter Takes Command.

THE SPANISH REGIMENTS DEPOSIT THEIR ARMS.

The American Occupation of the Port is Complete.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, July 18.—The War Department posted the following bulletin at 5.15 p. m. yesterday:

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, July 17.—To the Adjutant-General, U. S. A., Washington: "I have the honor to announce that the American flag has this instant—12 o'clock—been hoisted over the house of the civil government in the city of Santiago, in the presence of an immense concourse of people, the infantry presenting arms and bands playing the national air.

A light battery fired a salute of twenty-one guns. Perfect order is now being maintained by the municipal government. The distress is great but there is little sickness in the town and scarcely any yellow fever.

A small gunboat and about 200 seamen left by Cervera have surrendered to me.

The obstructions are being removed from the north of the harbor.

Upon coming into the city I discovered a perfect entanglement of defences.

Fighting as the Spaniards did first day, it would have cost five thousand lives to have taken it.

Battalions of Spanish troops have been depositing arms since daylight in the armory, over which I have a guard.

General Toral formally surrendered the Plaza and all stores at 9 a. m.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—It is stated that at the conference yesterday plans were discussed for an aggressive movement in which both the army and navy will take part against Porto Rico.

It is expected that General Miles will go direct from Santiago to Porto Rico, and that Stone and Col. Michler, of his staff, will leave from New York in a day or two on the Resolute to join the General at Santiago.

THE MILITIA OF CANADA

The Establishment List Just Issued.

A BEARER COMPANY TO BE ADDED TO FORCE.

To be Formed at Halifax Sixty-four Strong.

OTTAWA, July 18.—The militia establishment list just issued shows the total strength of permanent force to be 865, active militia 45,408.

Authority has been given to form a bearer company at Halifax, the first of the kind in Canada. The total strength will be 64. It will be officered by the surgeon major in command and two surgeon lieutenants. There will also be one sergeant-major, one staff sergeant, five sergeants, six corporals, one bugler and 47 privates.

The writer knows he had none. His ever-ready, obliging, charitable disposition was incomparable with such a word as enmity. Where was the man who more quickly responded to the call of the neighbor in temporal necessities, or to that of the parish priest in church affairs, than Tom Monaghan; when the virtue of charity should be predominant either in assisting the needy, sheltering the traveller from the storm, or in the more worthy duty of shielding the christian from the worse storm of calumny, Tom Monaghan spoke and acted in the right time and place. Truly a melancholy scene was enacted on Tuesday morning the 5th July, in St. Joseph's Churchyard, when the caskets of our two departed friends were laid, not six feet apart, surrounded by grief-stricken friends, so sadly, so suddenly bereaved, and hundreds of sympathizers of all denominations, and in the midst of all our beloved priest performing the sad but beautiful two-fold ceremony of committing "earth to earth," to await the summons which shall call us all together. Mr. Monaghan leaves a heart-broken widow, father and sister on the Island, and a mother, brother and sister in the United States. May God comfort and console his disconsolate widow, parents and friends, and give eternal rest to his own soul.

THE TERMS OF CAPITULATION

A Great Achievement for Shafter.

SPANIARDS TO MARCH OUT WITH HONORS OF WAR.

Spanish Irregulars to Remain in Cuba, on Parole.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, July 18.—Terms of the surrender sanctioned by Madrid are as follows:

First, declares that all hostilities shall cease pending the agreement to the official capitulation.

Second, that the capitulation included all the Spanish forces and the surrender of all war material within the prescribed limits.

Third, the transportation of troops to Spain at the earliest possible moment each force to be embarked at the nearest port.

Fourth, that Spanish officers shall retain their side arms, and enlisted men their personal property.

Fifth, that after the final capitulation the Spanish forces shall assist in the removal of all obstructions to navigation in Santiago harbor.

Sixth, that after the final capitulation commanding officers shall furnish complete inventory of all arms and munitions of war and a muster of all soldiers in the district.

Seventh, that the Spanish general shall be permitted to take the military archives and records with him.

Eighth, that all guerrillas and Spanish irregulars shall be permitted to remain in Cuba if they so elect, giving a parole that they will not again take up arms against the United States unless properly prepared.

Ninth, that the Spanish forces shall be permitted to march out with all the honors of war depositing their arms, which will be disposed of by the United States in future.

A Madrid member of the Cabinet in an interview, asserted that the Government is seeking an honorable peace with the United States.
