THOMAS H. MERCIER There passed away at his home in Gaspereaux, on Friday, January 4th, Mr. Thomas H. Mercier in the eighty-fifth year of his age. Deceased had been in failing health, and confined to his bed for two or three months previous to his death. In November 1950, he had an operation performed to relieve him of an internal condition and during the spring and summer of that year, he seemed to be his old vigorous self, but last fall, the malady again became active and, despite the best medical care and kind nursing of his wife and daughter, Mrs. John Kelly, his progress could not be arrested and he died on the above date.

The late Mr. Mercier was born in Labrador and moved with his family to Lunenburg, N. S., at a very early age. There he spent his boyhood and young manhood in Lunenburg and its environs. Blue Rock, Feltzen South, Tantr's Island, and other spots, people with sturdy followers of the sea. It was only natural that, hearing tales of far places, and distant shores that he embraced the life of a sailor with all its hazards but great adventure. For many years he sailed the Seven Seas until the time he reached early middle life and then came to Gaspereaux where he settled down, and married Miss Margaret Steele. His first wife had died in Lunenburg, N. S.

Gaspereaux he engaged in fishing lobster, mackerel, cod, herring, etc., and was one of the most successful fishermen on the coast. To this calling he devoted the remainder of his days and even last summer, when his health was seriously impaired he made a very substantial catch.

He was a very kind man in the home, and also a good neighbour; was honest and upright in all his dealings and withal, was a sound and worthy citizen who, in this small sphere, contributed his full share to the general good and well-being of the community.

His funeral took place on January seventh to St. Paul's Church, Sturgeon, where the services at the church and graveside were conducted by Rev. F. L. Mullanly, who visited him frequently during his illness and from whom he received the last rites of the Catholic Church.

MR. CYRUS SMITH At the P. E. I. Hospital on May 31, 1952, there passed away Mr. Cyrus Smith, age 79, of New Glasgow, N.S. Deceased was entered the hospital about a week previous to his death.

Although in failing health for the past few years his sudden passing came as a shock to relations and friends as he had been exceptionally well and active through the winter months, able to walk out every line day, interested in the farm affairs and local happenings until a few days before he was taken suddenly ill. Mr. Smith was a successful farmer, upright and diligent in business and practical in his farming methods.

A lifelong resident of New Glasgow and an esteemed citizen he was ever ready and willing to contribute generously to church and community welfare and aid every other good cause, and he will be greatly missed.

In the home he was kindly and hospitable and enjoyed having his neighbours and friends drop in for a sociable and friendly chat. Now there is a vacant chair and the sound of that voice is stilled.

Cyrus was the youngest and last surviving member of the family of the late John Smith and wife Anne Stevenson Smith of New Glasgow. Predeceased brothers and sisters were, namely, Watson of Wheatley River, Rev. John, U.S.A. and Hammond, a student minister who died in early manhood; sisters, Elizabeth, Amelia, Mrs. J. MacNeil, Maud, Mrs. George Stevenson and Martha Smith. He is survived by his son Richard B. and daughter-in-law, Ada; also three grandchildren Myrna, Orville and Norman, whom he loved very dearly.

Also surviving are a number of nieces and nephews who will cherish his memory. The funeral took place on April 2 and despite the bad condition of the roads a large crowd assembled at the home to pay their last tribute of respect to a departed soul.

The service at the home and grave was conducted by Rev. Mr. Watterworth. Hymns sung were "The Lord Is My Shepherd", "Peace Perfect Peace", and "Abide With Me." The pall bearers were Messrs. EDWIN McFARLANE The death occurred at Annandale on Easter Sunday, April 13, 1952, of Mr. Edwin McFarlane at the advanced age of 91 years.

The late Mr. McFarlane was born at Lower Montague in this Province on May 24, 1861, the son of the late Alexander and Janet (Johnston) McFarlane.

In the year 1877 he came to Annandale to reside with and assist his uncle the late James Johnstone in conducting a general merchandise and farm produce business. Later, upon the death of his uncle he became manager. Other business interests included a lobster packing plant at Cape Spry, which he operated successfully for many years.

He was a man blessed with a wonderful physique, seldom, if ever, requiring the services of a physician until November 11, 1950, when he suffered a heart attack from which he recovered sufficiently to engage in light duties, until Wednesday, April 9, 1952, when, while sitting reading the daily paper he suffered a severe stroke and passed away approximately four days later without regaining consciousness.

The late Mr. McFarlane was a man with a very large number of friends of all classes and creeds, possessed with a very pleasing personality, a wide knowledge of world affairs and a keen sense of humor, all combined to make him an unusually interesting and pleasant conversationalist. He was a faithful friend and a kind obliging neighbor. The almost invariable comment of his many friends was that he was a "gentleman" and is eloquently descriptive of the manner of man he was, and the treasure of esteem in which he was held. He was a prominent member of the Masonic Order, having been initiated into the membership of the Orient Lodge No. 11, A.F. and A.M., Souris, on February 21, 1893.

In his passing the United Church of Canada in Annandale, of which he was a faithful member, has been deprived of a pillar of strength. He filled the office of secretary-treasurer for many years and the words of his minister, "Did his work faithfully and well."

In politics he was a faithful supporter of the Liberal party to which he was always loyal, but never to the point of narrowness, commending that which he considered to be for the common good, and constructively criticizing that with which he disagreed in all party politics.

On October 24, 1893, the Liberal party honored him by nominating him to contest the Georgetown district as the party's standard bearer in the provincial general election of that year. His opponent was the late Honorable Daniel Gordon, Georgetown. The late Mr. McFarlane was unsuccessful by a very small margin.

A tribute to his sense of justice and good judgment was his appointment as Justice of the Peace for King's County a number of years ago.

The late Mr. McFarlane was united in marriage with Emma Jane Jenkins, daughter of the late James G. Jenkins, Little River, Prince Edward Island, on February 9, 1887. The officiating clergyman was the late Rev. J. G. Cameron.

The sorrowing son and two daughters bereft of a kind and loving father are Alexander James in the old home and business stand at Annandale; Lillith Pearl (Mrs. William B. Mills), Howe Bay, and Mary Edna (Mrs. Elby B. Howlett), Annandale; one daughter, Janet Johnston (Mrs. Taylor Wood), predeceased him in 1943. There are also left to mourn 7 grandchildren and 4 great grandchildren. The funeral service was held on April 15 and was very largely attended considering the almost impassable condition of the roads.

After a short service at the home, his remains were conveyed to the Annandale United Church of Canada where an impressive service was conducted by his minister, Lie. A. Brown, who delivered a comforting message based on 1 Corinthians, chapter 15; verse 55: Oh! Death where is thy sting? Oh! Grave where is thy victory? The hymns sung were, "The Lord Is My Shepherd", "Rock of Ages", and "Forever With The Lord." A duet, "The Last Mile", was beautifully and sympathetically rendered by Messrs. New Wiltshire. O'Leary Co-op Has Splendid Year

The annual meeting of the O'Leary Farmers Co-operative Association Limited was held in the O'Leary Community Hall on Thursday night, May 1. There was a very large attendance and reports submitted showed that the Co-operative had a very successful year.

Total sales increased over the previous year by \$127,890.30 now totalling \$639,717.78. This is the largest total of any Co-operative in the Province.

Pulpwood sales amounted to \$34,477.09, a commodity handled for the first time this year. Potato sales also show a large increase of \$38,820.47. The other large increases were feed, eggs, service station and hatchery.

Operating expenses increased \$7,135.20. The largest increase was in wages, an increase of \$4,248.05. The Co-op distributed \$35,251.49 in wages to residents of the village of O'Leary, an important factor in the economic life of the village.

The financial report which was read by Mr. J. G. Dennis, Supervisor of Co-operatives, Charlottetown, stated in part: "Your co-operative association has had a very successful year from the standpoint of sales and profit. It is quite evident that further expansion is necessary in some departments if the required services are to be provided for the members."

The guest speaker was Rev. J. D. Nelson MacDonald of Dartmouth, N.S. Rev. Mr. MacDonald, who is an United Church minister and has had much experience in co-operative work, was heard in a most interesting and instructive address. Brief remarks were also heard from several local members.

Mr. Arnold Wood was elected president. Mr. Ivan Webb, secretary and Mr. Elmer Woodside as vice-president. The new directors are: Bruce MacDougall in place of Gerald Gamble; Robert Woodside in place of Guy Harris; E. J. Sabine in place of Raeford Lock.
