**he Manitoba School Question**  
 POSITION OF THE PARTIES AND POLITICIANS  
 IN RESPECT TO IT.

(Special correspondence of The Examiner.)

The crowd that filled the galleries on  
 Monday night (6th March) was second  
 only to that which listened to the magni-  
 ficent speech of the Finance Minister a week  
 previously, about which I wrote you last  
 week. But there must have been more  
 than a little disappointment in the after-  
 noon, for Mr. Tarte, who opened the ball  
 on the Manitoba School Question, and who  
 spoke for two hours until six o'clock, con-  
 fined himself exclusively to the French lan-  
 guage. The members' seats were well  
 filled. The scene was changed from the  
 previous week. Then it was a strictly  
 party question, and the lines were tightly  
 drawn; last night it was a ques-  
 tion largely of race and religion,  
 and divided among themselves. On the  
 Government side were the French Cana-  
 dian supporters of the administration who  
 sympathize with the Manitoba minority  
 and desire a remedy to be applied to the  
 grievances they suffer under the new  
 Schools Act. I don't think I saw an un-  
 desirable in saying that the sympathies of  
 these gentlemen are expressed more  
 loudly because the sufferers are  
 nearly all of their own nation-  
 ality. I don't believe that the ques-  
 tion of religious education has so much to  
 do with the outcry against Mr. Greenway's  
 School Act, as the fact that the parties  
 principally interested are French-Cana-  
 dians. With these gentlemen, it is not  
 that they love religion less, but that they  
 love nationality more. Then there are the  
 Irish and Scotch Catholic Conservatives,  
 who do not take the extreme view of their  
 French Canadian colleagues, and who,  
 while they conscientiously believe in the  
 principle of religious education in the  
 schools, cannot work themselves up to a  
 fury over an educational system similar to  
 that which they themselves have to submit  
 to in the Lower Provinces. Then there  
 are the Orange Conservatives who are un-  
 willing to accede to any sort of demand  
 from the Catholic hierarchy, and lastly,  
 there are the Conservatives who, deprecating  
 the introduction of religious subjects,  
 insist that each province shall settle its  
 own educational system, and that the  
 Manitoba School Act must not be inter-  
 fered with.

The Liberal party is composed of the  
 French element who battle for their fellow  
 countrymen, a few strong Protestants who  
 honestly believe in the non-sectarian  
 principle, and a larger number of liberal  
 Protestants who would be willing to allow  
 the establishment of a separate school  
 system such as obtains in Ontario. Your  
 readers will have some idea from this crude  
 explanation of how delicately things are  
 mixed. But governing all is the unanimous  
 desire of the Opposition to embarrass the  
 Government. This is evident from the  
 wording of Mr. Tarte's motion which care-  
 fully avoids declaring whether the demand  
 of the Manitoba Catholics is just or unjust  
 —whether their claims have any warrant  
 or not—and confines itself to disapproving  
 the action of the Government in the  
 measures adopted thus far in dealing with  
 the question. It is a motion that Mr.  
 Tarte and Mr. Dalton McCarthy can both  
 support, though their views as to how  
 the obnoxious question shall finally be  
 disposed of, differ as widely as the poles.

I have fully described the positions of  
 both parties and the different elements  
 composing the Government and Opposition.  
 None the less interesting is it to glance at  
 some of the individual members and en-  
 quire what are their private views upon  
 certain important questions. First of all is  
 Sir John Thompson, a convert from one of  
 the strictest Protestant sects to a church  
 which, rightly or wrongly, is looked upon  
 with suspicion and alarm by Protestants in  
 general. Such a man is the leader of a  
 party whose principal support is the Orange  
 institution of the great Protestant Pro-  
 vince of Ontario. The Premier's  
 chief Ontario lieutenants are Mackenzie,  
 Bowell and Clarke Wallace, two men who  
 have held the highest posts of honor in the  
 gift of the Orange Order of the world. I  
 don't know that John Haggart brings any  
 religious support to the administration, but  
 he is a strong man with a certain very  
 necessary element of the party, John  
 Carling, without being a positively strong  
 man, has a long and clear record, and is  
 very popular with the farmers. J. C.  
 Patterson is the President of the Conser-  
 vative Association of Ontario, is an Irish  
 Protestant, a Home Rule sympathizer, and  
 an anti-Orange man! So much for Ontario.  
 The Government command small support  
 from Quebec, but the Frenchmen are not the  
 men they were twenty years ago. The great  
 leaders are not to the point. Charleau has  
 retired to Spencerwood, and Langevin,  
 without a following, sits almost unnoticed  
 on the front opposition benches. Yet he is  
 watching everything that is going on, and  
 it is hinted is awaiting a favorable oppor-  
 tunity to assert himself once more as the  
 French Canadian leader. Side by side  
 with Clarke Wallace sits John Gavigan,  
 Irish Catholic and Home Ruler, "first, last,  
 and all the time." Behind him sits J. J.  
 Curran, his rival in the affections of his  
 fellow countrymen. Further on are Dalton  
 McCarthy, Col. O'Brien and Alexander  
 McNeill, Irish Protestants and anti-Home  
 Rulers—a select coterie. There are also  
 Cuckburn, Denison and Cousworth, rep-  
 resentatives of Toronto, the great Protestant  
 stronghold. There are the Scotch Cath-  
 olics—such as Dr. Cameron, of Inverness,  
 Austin Macdonald, and Gilles, of Rich-  
 mond—a more Conservative than Sir John  
 McDonald ever was. Then we have  
 Michael Adams and McInerney, Irish  
 Catholics, with strong independant tenden-  
 cies, yet supporting the Administration  
 List, but not least, Col. Amyot, who, if he  
 glories in anything more than being French

and Catholic, it is that he is a British sub-  
 ject.


Of men holding such divergent private  
 opinions is the parliamentary representa-  
 tion of the Conservative party composed.  
 Yet nearly all of them are a unit as to the  
 policy they consider best calculated to pro-  
 mote the interests of Canada. Recognizing  
 that, until the millennium at least, men will  
 be Protestants and Catholics, and will con-  
 tinue to be influenced more or less by  
 national and local prejudices and jealousies,  
 they sensibly agree to differ upon these  
 points and bend their energies to build up  
 the trade of their country and to promote  
 its commercial and social prosperity. I  
 have said that most of the Conservative  
 members are agreed, for just now it is hard  
 to place Dalton McCarthy and Col.  
 O'Brien. Every Administration has its  
 troubles, and there is no reason to fear that  
 with the prudence and good judgment that  
 characterizes the leaders of the Conserva-  
 tive party, the difficult question of the  
 Manitoba schools will be satisfactorily  
 solved.

When the House resumed at 8 p. m.,  
 Mr. Tarte repeated his speech in English.  
 It consisted mainly of a rehash of the  
 "editorial" which appeared in his paper,  
 "Le Canadien," during the past few months.  
 He demanded remedial legislation for the  
 Catholics of Manitoba, and denounced the  
 action of the Government, whom he ac-  
 cused of trifling with the subject and of  
 deceiving Archbishop Tache, and of any  
 number of other crimes no less serious.  
 Instead, however, of following up his argu-  
 ments, and moving that the Government  
 should right the wrongs of which he com-  
 plained, he contented himself with an  
 amendment stating "that this House de-  
 sires to express its disapproval of the action  
 of the Government in dealing with the  
 Manitoba school question, and in assuming  
 to be possessed of judicial functions con-  
 fided in their duty as constitutional ad-  
 visers of the Crown, which assumption is  
 wholly unknown to the law, and if now  
 acquiesced in will be entirely subversive of  
 the principle of ministerial responsibility."  
 Mr. Tarte was followed by the member  
 for Provencher (Manitoba), Mr. La Riviere,  
 a portly gentleman so strongly resembling  
 Mr. W. C. DesBrisay that the latter, very  
 much to the amusement of his friends, is  
 frequently taken for him. Mr. DesBrisay  
 is also occasionally taken for Dr. Mon-  
 roque, Mr. Fraser, M. P. for Guysboro, and  
 Mr. Favel, M. P. for Bonaventure, so  
 that he has a busy time of it to preserve his  
 identity. Mr. La Riviere is an ardent  
 champion of his countrymen in Manitoba,  
 but he opposed Mr. Tarte's amendment;  
 and indeed, from the manner of his speech,  
 seems to entertain no very exalted opinion  
 of that gentleman. Mr. La Riviere con-  
 sidered that the Government are doing the  
 right thing in their way of dealing with the  
 question, and he deprecated making political  
 capital out of it.
