WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Feb. 15.

An Anglo-Austrian alliance is now probable. Torpedoes have been shipped at Odessa for the Russians to close the Bosphorus.

A Vienna despatch says excitement is increasing. The Emperor has sent for the Arch Duke Albert as commander-in-chief of the Austro-Hungarian army, to act in concert. Important military measures have been taken.

Despatches from Constantinople report the British fleet arrived there and that the Turkish parliament has been dissolved.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.

The debate on the address continues.

Mr. Pope spoke about the Northern Light and the Souris breakwater. He hoped that the mail arrangements would be improved, and that the Government would try their experiments in ice navigation on some less important mail route than that of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Yeo spoke on the Fishery Award and the Premier's visit to the Island. He was well received by the House.

McCallum charged the Government with extravagance in railway and other matters, and with using old rails for party purposes. He argued in favor of Protection, referring to the United States tariff. Mr. Young said the repetition of all the stale exploded slanders that were circulated degraded Parliament and our institutions. This mode of assailing the characters of public men must be condemned. Sir John A. Macdonald has expressed amazement at his moderation in accepting money; yet all people say how dangerous it was to trust him with power. The Government had acted strictly up to its principles. The Opposition principles were severe—five leaves and two fishes. He was confident this able and economical Administration would be sustained by the people.

Mr. W. Gibbs (Ontario) made an argument in favor of protection to manufactures and agricultural products.

Mr. Patterson said the Opposition found fault with the speech because it promised only ordinary business, but they pointed to no extraordinary matters needing attention. Several industries were languishing because of too many manufacturers, and the protection they wanted was only from each other. Mr. Farrow attacked Mr. Cartwright in finance, and said the Premier's Steel Rail Purchase wasted \$1,644,000.

Mr. Pope charged the Premier with allowing the Souris breakwater to go to ruin for want of a little protection, and dwelt on the unsatisfactory character of the Island mail service.

Mr. Caron defended the Premier and Mr. Laurier on the Quebec question.

Mr. Yeo spoke of Island matters.

St. JOHN, N. B., Feb. 15.

Vaughan, the supposed murderer of Mary Quinn, was arrested at Little River on the 13th inst; evidence points strongly to him as the murderer.

At the business meeting of the Alberton Reform Club, on last Friday night, the following were appointed officers for the ensuing quarter: Hon. Mr. Reid, President; E. Bourke, Vice do.; J. P. Fielding, Sec'y; J. J. McLellan, Fin. Sec'y. The number of members in good standing now figure up 265, and present prospects are encouraging. We would suggest, however, that the regular meetings be held weekly, instead of bi-weekly, as at present. It would also be a good idea to have debates on alternate meetings. This would supply the deficiency of a most important society, which every well-regulated community should constantly keep up, viz., a "Debating Club." The duties of each male member of a community are twofold, personal and public. The latter duties necessitate the person not infrequently to speak and think before an assembly, and worst of all—on his feet. Except in the case of a few heaven-born orators, the latter gift is only acquired (like most of the usual endowments) step by step, and by the slow and tedious process of trial and error. Many of our men of almost wide-world celebrity have taken their first and most important lessons in public speaking in the village debating club. A word to the wise, etc.—*Alberton Pioneer.*

EDITOR.—Permit me, through your widely circulated journal, to call the attention of our civic authorities to the necessity of enforcing the Law respecting chimney sweeping, as it is of great importance to every citizen. This work should not be entrusted to the class of people that formerly had the doing of it, for it is impossible to get them to do the work when required. I have known a citizen to send for one of those worthies no less than five times (to sweep), but failed to get him to do so. He had to do it himself. I think this work should be let to some responsible party at a paying scale of prices; and a By-law should be passed to enable the contractor to collect his fees. Unless this is done at once, there is no knowing what the consequences may be. There is scarcely a day but some chimney or another is on fire.

I hope the Mayor and Council will not look over this matter without taking any action on it.

DEAR SIR,—Not long since there appeared in the columns of your paper a communication over the sign and manual of "Blue Ribbon," which brought the Government of the day to task for appointing an officer for the purpose of inspecting the numerous licensed taverns which exist on our Island. Mr. Editor, I as one of the same color as himself, agree with the arguments which he has brought before the notice of the public, and would state that it is only a piece of injustice which has been perpetrated upon the people of this Island. The Inspector, as a Government official, as a matter of course, has his duties to perform; but Mr. Editor, the duties set apart for this officer are too limited, and the Government of the day have been too negligent and careless in their official capacity in this respect. Now, Mr. Editor, your correspondent has hit the right mark when he states that we should have, as in the United States, saloons—that is, if it is required by the general travelling public—which can produce and give when called for a drink—which is both beneficial and healthful. Mr. Editor, the time has arrived when this kind of toadyism shall be done away with; and, instead of such limited power being extended to a man who in the least don't—with all due deference to him—know the difference between rum and water. Then, I say, that such should be wiped off the list of our Government officials; and further, that the Government of the present day—if they do not remedy the grievance—have forfeited the confidence reposed in them by three-fourths of this our Island. And if the people require proof to show that the ale which is at present manufacture is not only a beverage, I will be only too happy to show and prove that such is the case.

In conclusion, Mr. Editor, I hope that the Legislature will, at its next session, remedy the obnoxious appointment which is already in existence.

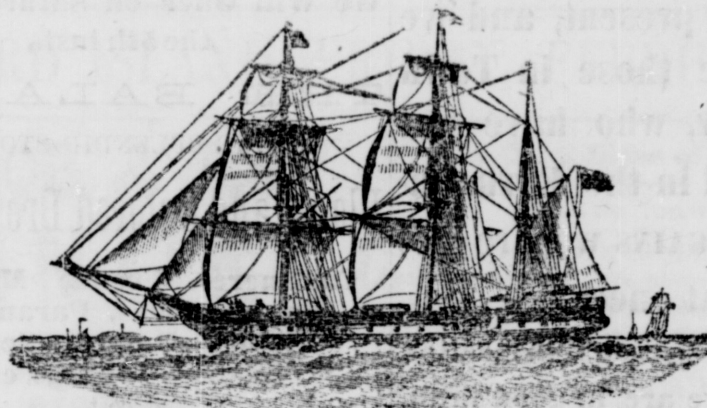

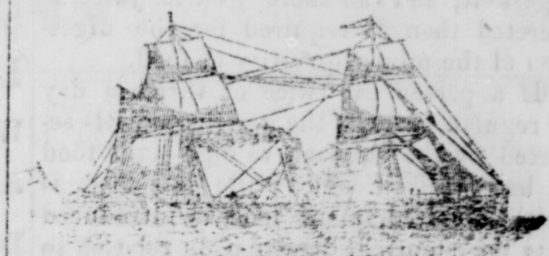
