## Island Firm Awarded Contract Of \$119,202

OTTAWA — A contract for the construction of a boat harbor at Sea Cow Pond has been awarded to Northumberland Construction Limited of Abrams Village, N.S. announced here today by Public Works Minister George McRath.

Two bids were opened Oct. 6 and the winning tender was for \$119,202. The higher bid was for \$128,270.

Sea Cow Pond is at the North-western tip of P.E.I. and two miles south of North Point. It is a fishing community where the two main activities are the lobster fishery and gathering of Irish Moss.

The new boat harbor will consist of two creosoted pilework piers, 260 by 15 feet, built 40 feet apart to provide an entrance channel. There is a landing at the inner end of each pier 125 by 12 feet and the dredging of an irregular area about 260 feet by 200 feet to a depth of five feet below low water ordinary spring tides.

Plans and specifications were prepared in the office of the district engineer for the department of public works at Charlottetown.

## 60 Exhibitors From Province Entering Atlantic Winter Fair

Approximately 10 Prince Edward Island steers will compete in the steer show at the Atlantic Winter Fair on opening day, Saturday. The Guardian has learned from secretary J. Watson Maxner. Top prizes of \$100 apparently have influenced the entries in the dairy classes where about 60 exhibitors from this province have entered animals. There are 11 beef breeders competing in the big show, in addition to those who have steers entered.

Fulton Sanderson and Sons have three really good Herford steers as the Sanderson farm seeks to retain the top honors Fulton won a year ago when his big white face animal was grand champion of the show. In addition to Fulton's steer this year, there is one being shown by Robert and one by Johnny Sanderson.

The Sanderson steers are uniformly good. Any one of them is as good, or better than the one that took it all a year ago. But the competition will be tougher this year, Fulton expects. He suggests Irving MacDonald, York, has a real threat for AWF supremacy. And there are many others from this province.

Robert McLaurin, and Son Lot 16, who had the Easter Beef Show grand champion here several years ago, also have a steer at Halifax.

The steers are shown Saturday afternoon. The sale is that night.

Beef breeders showing in the regular classes include Leo MacIsaac, Mermaid; Lester Rankin and Son, Mt. Herbert; Boyd Dixon and Mack Dixon, Clyde River with Angus cattle.

### University Students' Union Requests Government Help

A brief submitted to the provincial cabinet yesterday by St. Dunstan's University Students' Union suggested that the provincial government absorb any rise in fees beyond the present level of \$400 and that the government also assume a greater role in financing higher education by adopting a plan for financial assistance.

The brief was submitted by Dave Morton, president of the students' union; Thomas MacMillan, chairman of the Canadian Union of Students at SDU, and Charles MacMillan, who read the brief to the cabinet.

The brief stated that students across Canada and in particular those in the Maritimes have faced unparalleled costs. "We have reached the point where such escalation is in most areas beyond the student's means to pay the price."

In agreement with the Bladen Commission the brief did not think bursaries, scholarships or students' loans are the final solution though they have lessened the financial burden on the student. "No qualified student should be prevented by the lack of means from going to university. This must mean a greater commitment from the public treasury to achieve his important objective," said the brief.

**BIGGER ROLE**  
Despite the fact that the 26 per cent of the province's funds are used for education the brief states, "we cannot help but be of the opinion the provincial government must play a bigger role in this field, particularly at the university level."

The brief of the SDU Students' Union stated they are in agreement with the position taken by the Summer Congress of the Canadian Union of Students which resolved as a first priority the abolition of social and financial barriers and the elimination of tuition fees for university students and the Congress also was to request the federal government to establish a system of grants to the provinces on the basis of need without stipulation how these grants were to be spent and the regional CUS associations were encouraging the provincial governments to spend these grants on education.

## RCMP Superintendent Asks Sane Hallowe'en

Supt. A. S. McNeil, RCMP of-ficer commanding I. Division has issued an urgent appeal to all citizens, children, motorists and householders alike to aid in providing a truly sane Hallowe'en this year.

Commending the handling of the annual party night by the great majority of people, and favoring its observance by the children for the fun they obtain, the Superintendent deplored the tendency on the part of some older youths towards dangerous pranks.

He asked the public to assist as far as possible in curbing this by doing the following:

- (1) Removing temptation, by locking up or putting away equipment and machinery.
- (2) Once again providing good wholesome recreation on Hallowe'en Night. (as so many service clubs have done in the past years.)
- (3) Providing adequate supervision and discipline for children.
- (4) Providing descriptions of cars and persons to aid in the apprehension of persons responsible for these acts and if necessary to be willing to appear in court to give evidence against them.

**WORD OF CAUTION**  
As a word of caution to the motorists: the RCMP head said: "On Hallowe'en children are bound to be running about with little thought for traffic hazards they may encounter, their vision possibly obscured by a mask or some form of disguise. Therefore, it is up to you, the motorist, to make the necessary adjustment in your own movements. Perhaps more than any other night of the year a driver must operate his car with extreme caution wherever children are apt to be. This means MUCH slower speeds in residential areas. It also means you must be alert to the need for instant braking at all times."

"It should be needless to say that our Force will have every available man and transport on duty during the night of October 30th, or that we have the usual backing of the Department of the Attorney General. As in past years, it is our intention to bring all persons before the courts who violate the law in any manner and expect justice to be meted out accordingly."

**Police Probe Sudden Death**

The funeral will be held from Bowness Funeral Home here at 2 p.m. on Thursday. Interment will be in Lot 11 cemetery.

Visiting hours today are from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m.

### \$100 Bail Set In Theft Case
