

Local and Other Items.

STREAMERS' MOVEMENTS.—Both St. Lawrence and Stanley left for Pictou this morning.

L. O. O. F.—A special session of St. Lawrence Lodge will be held this evening at half-past seven, for degrees.

SHOULD BE MORE CAREFUL.—In the Montreal police court on Monday, O. Valais, druggist, was fined \$75 for selling laudanum without a label on the bottle.

SCOTT ACT.—Yesterday a vote on the repeal of the Scott Act was taken in fourteen counties or cities in Ontario. The results are given in to-day's telegrams.

MILITIA.—Mr. L. E. Prowse has been appointed Second Lieutenant of No. 2 Battery C. A., in the place of J. H. Bell, resigned. The appointment is a very popular one.

Y. M. C. A.—The Young Men's Bible Class will meet this evening, at 8 o'clock, in the new parlour. A large attendance is requested, as some special business will be transacted.

KANSAS ELECTIONS.—A wholesale liquor dealer has been elected Mayor of Wichita, Kan., and two other liquor men have been returned members of the Council. Kansas is a Prohibition State!

NOT CONFIRMED.—It is reported that the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council has given judgment in the suit between the Dominion of Canada and British Columbia in favor of the Province. The suit arose out of a claim of the Dominion to minerals in the lands granted by the Province in aid of the C. P. R. The rumor has not been confirmed.

WHITECAPS IN ONTARIO.—At Morrisburg, Ont., on Friday night, 29th ult., a man named Wm. Pranner drew a revolver and deliberately fired at Frank Beckstead, the ball grazing his head; and later on a mob of Whitecaps demanded the surrender of an alleged black-mailer named Wenborn, who had taken refuge in a hotel but they withdrew their demand on Wenborn handing over \$15 for division among them. No attempt has been made to make an arrest in either of these cases, the police evidently being afraid to exercise their authority.

KISS THE TWINS.—William Gallagher, a Boston embezzler, finding the "Hub" too sultry for him started rather suddenly for New Brunswick a few nights ago. The first intimation his young wife had of his departure was the receipt of the following telegram bearing an Eastport date:—

AN ISLANDER INJURED.—From the Seattle, W. T. Post it is learned that on the 15th ult., John Kenny, of Summerside, brother to Mr. Jas. R. Kenny, while assisting to unload a heavy piece of machinery from the steamer Frontier, at Tacoma, had his left leg crushed almost to a pulp at the knee, by the fall of the machinery. He was removed to a hospital and the leg amputated, but the surgeons pronounce the chance for his recovery very doubtful. He was employed on the Frontier for the past year and a half, and the captain spoke of him as one of the best men he ever had.

THE PARNELL COMMISSION.—When the Parnell Commission met on Tuesday morning Sir Charles Russell resumed his argument on behalf of the Parnellites, and contended that the objects of the Irish National League were justifiable. The issue before the Commission depended upon proof that Parnell and his colleagues, under cloak of the land movement, planned murders and outrages. If no such evidence was produced the Commission must declare that the accused men were earnestly endeavoring to lift an intolerable burden from the shoulders of their countrymen. The examination of Mr. Parnell was fixed for Tuesday next.

HE WAS BASIFUL.—A New Brunswick exchange has the following:—On Thursday, March 21st, Mr. Henry Short, an employee in the McAdam railway works, and Miss Bertie Boon, of McAdam, left by express train for Presque Isle, where they were united in marriage, but on his return Mr. Short met with a serious accident, by taking a leap from the car and losing his balance. He struck the sleepers and gravel, cutting his left knee and right hand and forehead very badly. It seems he was basiful, and did not care to meet his fellow workmen at the station, who were there with open arms to welcome him back.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debates and Proceedings.

THE SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES.

OTTAWA, April 4.

Hon. Mr. Foster brought down the supplementary estimates this afternoon for the year ending June 30th, 1889, totalling \$2,007,167 as follows: Chargeable to consolidated fund, \$1,154,132; to capital, \$419,040; to capital territorial account, \$58,100; unprovided items, \$465,890. The items for P. E. Island are: Charlottetown Dominion Building, \$675; repairs to piers and breakwaters, \$2,000; P. E. Island Railway, \$15,000; in settlement of James King's claim for terminating of his mail contract between P. E. Island and the Mainland, \$2,960.

This afternoon, Sir John and Mr. Laurier delivered eloquent tributes to the memory of the late Hon. Mr. Pope.

Mr. Small gave notice of a reconsideration of the divorce bill of W. H. Lowery, thrown out yesterday, on the ground that many members had since seen the evidence and had changed their minds.

The franchise amendment act was discussed up to recess.

The franchise bill was further debated after recess until nine o'clock, when progress was reported.

Hon. Mr. Tupper brought up for its second reading the bill to amend the act respecting the safety of ships. He stated that the bill had been up last year, and during recess had been submitted to ship owners and others interested, who had approved of its provisions. Its object was to strengthen the existing act. It defines unseaworthiness according to the English act by over-loading, under-loading imperfect loading or insufficient manning. The second and fifth sections relate to grain cargoes, and are taken from the English act of 1880 providing for the use of the Shipping Board or other proper means to prevent grain shifting. A section had been added at the instance of Collector Ruel of St. John, to prevent evasions of the deck load law at that port, which evasions had taken place by clearing for a port in the United States instead of for their actual destination, a European port. Section 8 adopted the English clause relating to contracts of service and assumes that in every contract the seaworthiness of the vessel is guaranteed, and provides that all reasonable means to secure that end shall be taken.

NOTES.

The C. P. R. debt consolidation bill will probably come up on Friday, and will be agreed to.

It is reported to-night that the Canadian Pacific have consented to build the Short Line, as asked for by many Maritime Province members.

SCOTT ACT ELECTIONS.

Big Majorities for Repeal.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 4.

The vote on the repeal of the Scott Act in Colchester was taken to-day and resulted in a sweeping majority for repeal. The full returns are not in, but those so far show very little opposition to repeal. In Truro, the shire town, only six per cent. of the vote polled was against repeal. The agitation for repeal was carried on entirely by temperance people, and the liquor dealers and their friends were indifferent spectators. The repeal of the Act seemed the only way to escape the rigors of legal technicalities in this particular county, and this accomplished, the temperance people believe they can suppress the traffic by the existing Provincial law.

TORONTO, April 4.

The Scott Act was repealed in the following towns and counties by the majorities set down: Guelph, 452; Lennox and Addington, 400; Kent, 2,000; St. Thomas, 570; Frontenac, 100; Victoria, 500; Northumberland and Durham, 600; Brant, 130; Wellington, 500; Ontario, 600; Carleton, 125; Peterboro, 430; Lincoln, 500.

Has Formally Accepted.

WASHINGTON, April 4.

Robert T. Lincoln called upon the President and Secretary Blaine to-day, and formally accepted the English mission. He will sail for England about the 14th May.

British Politics.

LONDON, April 4.

The House of Lords, by 95 to 75, to-day elected the Earl of Morley as Liberal chairman of committees, rejecting the Marquis of Salisbury's candidate, Lord Balfour, of Burleigh.
