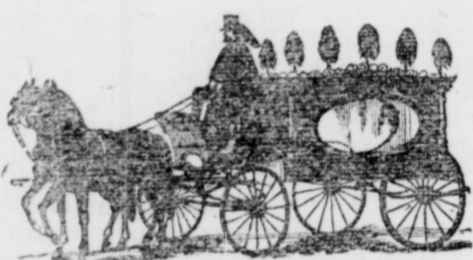

**THE MONTREAL ORANGE PARADE ON TWELFTH JULY.**

The telegrams from Montreal express fears that there will be serious trouble in that city between the Orangemen and their enemies on the approaching Twelfth of July should the former persist in having a public procession. The Orangemen have appealed to the Mayor for protection, but were told the law could not afford them any assistance whatever, and were advised not to parade. The authorities intend to enforce the statute against the carrying of deadly weapons; still the Irish unions, which number about 2,500 members, and the Orange lodges are said to be arming, but this is probably incorrect. The Boston Pilot, discussing the reports of a probable collision, speaks in this way:—"We hope no respectable Irishman will look with favor on the persons who, in the name of Ireland and Catholicity, attack the Orangemen. We detest the spirit of the Orange Society; but we hope that any man who assaults their parade will be severely punished. If the Orangemen are let alone, the liberal people of America will soon open their eyes to its mischievous and cowardly spirit. It must be admitted, too, and proved by bayonets, if necessary, that the Orangemen and all others who parade in peace, have a right so to parade, with the full protection of the law."

This morning's despatches express fears of trouble on the anniversary, and we are told the Orangemen on the Grand Trunk, from Brockville to Montreal, will visit the city on the Twelfth, and take part in the procession. The excitement is said to be intense; the Oka difficulties, the *enquete* on the "Queen Victoria," and the proposed Orange demonstration, has developed strong feeling between Protestants and Catholics.

**BREACH OF PROMISE ACTION AGAINST A LADY.**

At Dublin a singular breach of promise case was tried in the Common Pleas, before Chief Justice Morris and a special jury. The usual position of the parties was reversed, the gentleman being the plaintiff, and the lady the defendant. The plaintiff a butcher named Knowles, made the acquaintance of Mrs. Caroline Elizabeth Verschoyle [now Mulligan] the defendant, in October last, on board a steamboat during the voyage from Liverpool to Dublin. She was the widow of Captain Verschoyle, mistress of a fine residence—Roebuck Hall—in the County of Dublin, and mother of three children. Knowles was a widower, with one child. The acquaintance so rapidly ripened that in a short time she consented to become his bride. Being of different religions there was some difficulty about their marriage in Dublin, and they went to Liverpool, where they found it necessary to stop fourteen days before they could get married by the registrar, the expenses of the sojourn, which he swore amounted to £150, being paid by the plaintiff. In the meantime the lady's friends influenced her to break off the match, and she returned to Dublin without the plaintiff. She afterwards married a dealer in periodicals, named Andrew Mulligan, who is now master of Roebuck Hall, and a co-defendant in the suit. The examination of the plaintiff caused great merriment. After twenty minutes deliberation the jury gave him £200 damages.

**IMPROVED BREED OF DOGS FOR NEWFOUNDLAND.**

Our Newfoundland correspondent says that Herr T. A. Verkuzen, of Frankfort, the distinguished naturalist, who was to have accompanied Professor Hind on his Labrador expedition, arrived here lately, en route for Nova Scotia, and brought with him as a present to His Excellency Governor Glover, three very valuable dogs of the celebrated Leonberg breed. These animals are almost world-renowned for their size, beauty, sagacity, and fidelity. They are an improved breed, resulting from crossing the Newfoundland dogs with the Pyrenean St. Bernard dogs and the fine Pyrenean race. These dogs are the favorites of emperors, kings, and rich nobility, etc., and fetch as high a price as £50 to £100 sterling each. The Prince of Wales possesses one. Herr Verkuzen has brought them all the way from the borders of Switzerland. The true Newfoundland dog has almost disappeared here; but by the thoughtful kindness of Herr Verkuzen, an improved breed may now be obtained by this importation of new blood, and ultimately become a source of profit to the country, as such fine dogs will bring a high price all the world over. It will be necessary to cross them, in time, with the best Newfoundland dogs, selecting the strongest and best built. In due time we shall thus be able to boast of having the finest breed of dogs in the world, and our justly celebrated Newfoundland dogs will be superseded by a superior race. It is easy to imagine that the Governor will be overrun with applications for specimens. The dogs are but two months old, and consequently no progeny can be had for two years and a half.

PORTLAND, Oregon, July 4.—A gentleman arrived here from Yakim City states that the people of that region are greatly excited over a threatened Indian descent on the settlements. Raids for a space have been forwarded to Quilley by a special messenger. Several bands of armed Indians left the reservation to join Joseph's band and quietly withdrew from Gen. Howard's front.

**News of the World**

CANADA.

A hundred and eighty thousand head of cattle were killed in Montreal last year. In Montreal the high rate of mortality among young children is attributed to lack of food, owing to the hard times.

Sir Hugh Allan has transferred three thousand shares of Merchants' Bank stock to the Bank of Montreal, Banque du Peuple and the Union Bank.

The trustees of Zion church, Montreal, have refused to grant the use of that building to the Orangemen for the twelfth.

The Weights and Measure Department, Montreal, have begun to seize the scales, weights and measures of parties who neglected to have them stamped after due notice.

In Ottawa, the trial of the pilot and a sailor in connection with the Zouave trouble on steamer has taken place, and judgment is reserved.

At St. Catherine's, the Lincoln election scrutiny is again under headway. The result so far is six additional bad votes for Neelon and two for Rykert. The Grant-ham list will be next taken up.

There is much excitement in Guelph owing to the acceptance by the Town Council of an invitation to dine with the Papsi delegate to-morrow. Indignation meeting to night.

GREAT BRITAIN.

The steamer Volta, arrived here, reports that it is rumored the King of Dahomey, after paying the indemnity to the British Government, determined to make a human sacrifice of 500 of his men to the Fetish.

Our English files of papers announce the marriage, by Cardinal Manning, of Major Butte, late of the 69th, but now Assistant Deputy Quarter Master General, who distinguished himself in the Ashantee war, and is well known in Canada as the author of the "Great Lone Land," a book of Canadian travel, to the distinguished artist, Miss Thompson, who painted the picture that obtained first-class prizes at the London Art Exhibition, entitled the "Roll Call," "Battle of Inkerman," "Battle of Balaklava," and other military pieces.

Mr. Kruger and other delegates, bearing a protest from the late Government of the Transvaal Republic against British annexation, had an interview with Lord Carnarvon to-day. The latter informed them that it was impossible to reverse the decree of annexation.

FRANCE.

The anniversary of American independence was celebrated privately among the American residents. A number of houses were decorated with flags. In the evening Dr. Evans gave a dinner to the American Legation and the leading residents.

UNITED STATES.

A little Philadelphia boy startled a lady friend of the family the other day by remarking that he was 'four years old with clothes on.'

The execution of the "Molly Maguires" on the same day in Pennsylvania doubtless has been some check on the movements of this secret organization. But continued and vigorous measures will be necessary, it would seem, to show the power of law. Reports have been received from the mining districts that several witnesses against the Molly Maguire murderers have disappeared, and that two persons have been assassinated.

SOUTH AMERICA.

When Dom Pedro of Brazil is at home, he is easily accessible. On a certain day in the week he receives at his palace in Rio any one who chooses to come. His visitors await him in a long gallery, through which he walks at a given hour. Each explains his business, and the Emperor, who rapidly seizes the point of each recital, responds briefly in the language of the person who addresses him. He has a good memory, and he is never known to promise anything which he does not perform.

At the Irish Presbyterian Assembly recently held, the total number of communicants reported was 107,000—a decrease of 1000 upon last year. The contributions for all purposes were £142,720—a slight increase.

TURKEY.

The following story is related as illustrating "Turkish rule." A new Pasha, who had just been appointed to the government of a disturbed district in the North of Thessaly (notorious for every form of brigandage and violence), called together all the local officials immediately upon his arrival, and thus addressed them: "Gentlemen, I wish to mark my sense of your diligence and zeal by doubling your pay for a year, on condition that the moment a robbery is committed the officer in whose district it takes place shall be hanged forthwith." The Turks, regarding this startling prospect as a mere joke, accepted the terms, and went away chuckling. Shortly after a robbery did occur, and the official in command came smirking and rubbing his hands to say that he would "do all in his power" to discover the offenders, when the pasha's stern voice broke in: "On to the hook with him!" In two minutes more the luckless official was hanging by the shoulder-blades on hooks of steel; and it is a curious fact that no more robberies occurred in that district under that pasha's administration.
