CONSIDERING that this is the fourth—and, perhaps, the last—session of the present Dominion Parliament, the proceedings have, so far, been remarkably calm and business-like.

The Budget was duly criticised by Sir Richard Cartwright, and the result is that his party entertain serious thoughts of depositing him from the position of their Financial Leader.

Sir Charles Tupper has, we are pleased to see, put his foot down hard upon any other expensive little scheme of the lawyers.

The feeling of this country with respect to the late dastardly attempt upon the life of our gracious Queen, is well expressed by the following joint address, submitted in the Senate by Sir Alexander Campbell, and in the House of Commons by Sir John A. McDonald.

GRITS IN DISMAY!

OTTAWA, March 7.

In the House of Commons, yesterday, Hon. P. Fortin, Gaspé, introduced a bill to permit the electors on Magdalen Islands to vote by telegraph, when there are elections held in the district during the winter season.

Winter communication with Prince Edward Island and the mainland was discussed in the House of Commons yesterday. Messrs. Brecken, Hackett and Muttart complained that the interests of Prince Edward Island, as far as the winter service was concerned, had been overlooked, and they urged the fulfillment of the following terms of Confederation:—

SECTION 7.—That the Dominion Government shall assume and defray all the charges for the following services, viz:—

SECTION 8.—Efficient steam service for the conveyance of mails and passengers to be established and maintained between the Island and the mainland of the Dominion, winter and summer, thus placing the Island in continuous communication with the Intercolonial Railway, and the Railway system of the Dominion.

Mr. Brecken, M. P., Queen's County, moved for papers relating to the construction of Belle Creek Breakwater.

The reply of Her Majesty the Queen to the resolutions of congratulation was read in the House of Commons yesterday by Sir John McDonald, and in the Senate by Sir Alex. Campbell.

The Grits are in great suspense over the re-adjustment of seats.

The Opposition was led yesterday by Messrs. Killam and Mills—Mr. Blake having gone to Toronto to attend his sister's funeral.

Mr. MacKenzie was absent from the House yesterday.

Sir John McDonald is enjoying excellent health. He attends the House with vigor, and is actively engaged with the business of the Session.

The rumors of a general election in June cause consternation and dismay in Grit ranks. They look hopelessly on the coming contest.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, March 6.

The following note from Earl Granville, to the U. S. Minister Lowell, is printed:—

My Dear Mr. Lowell:

I have just received a message from the Queen, desiring me to convey Her Majesty's acknowledgments for the congratulations you offered, on behalf of the President and people of the United States, and to express her hearty thanks for the kind feeling manifested toward Her Majesty.

Yours, very sincerely, GRANVILLE.

In the Commons this afternoon, Sir Stafford Northcote moved that the House reaffirm its resolution that Bradlaugh be not permitted to go through the form of repeating the words of the oath. The motion was carried without division.

Mr. Majorbanks gave notice that he would ask leave to bring in a bill amending the law relating to the oath.

In the Commons this evening Mr. Gladstone, in moving an address to the Queen, referring to the recently attempted assassination, said such attempts upon the lives of rulers in other countries had been associated with some grievance or discontent; whereas the attempt upon the Queen was prompted solely by a morbid desire for notoriety in an intellect of the narrowest kind.

Sir Stafford Northcote seconded the motion for an address, and it was carried unanimously.

OTTAWA, March 6.

Sir Albert Smith asked if the construction of the Cape Tormentine Railway was under consideration.

Sir Charles Tupper said it was.

Sir Albert said it was said to be under consideration last session.

Sir Charles Tupper said well we have made some progress in the matter.

Sir John remarked, "oh don't be tormentin' us."

Mr. Brecken in moving for correspondence in connection with the winter communication with P. E. Island, complained that the terms under which that Province had entered the Union had not been fulfilled. He urged strongly that the Government should improve the route via the Capes.

Messrs. Muttart and Hackett spoke to the same effect.

LONDON, March 6.

MacLean, the would-be assassin of the Queen, was quietly removed on Saturday to Reading Jail. The Solicitor of his family writes that he possesses certificates of eminent physicians of the existence of mental aberration in the prisoner.
