P.E.I. Appointments

Group Headquarters is Lieut. Col. J. A. MacDonald, E.D., of Cardigan, P.E.I.

ASSUMES STAFF DUTIES

Lieut. Col. MacDonald, until the reorganization of the Reserve Force in September, held the Rank of Major in the Prince Edward Island Regiment. He has been promoted to his present rank recently in order to assume his duties as staff officer in charge of training of the new military group.

Associated with Lieut. Colonel MacDonald in the training branch is Major I. J. Harper, M.C., and Major A. L. Vickieson, both of Charlottetown.

Attached to the Group Headquarters staff from the Prince Edward Island Regiment are Captain I. A. Beaumont of Halifax together with one Sergeant Major and two Sergeant instructors.

The instruction provided to the militia units of the group by Lieutenant Colonel MacDonald and his training staff include: A militia staff course. A conversion course—Artillery to armour.

A senior non-commissioned officer's course for all units. A junior non-commissioned officer's course for all units. The above training staff is also required to give instructional assistance to each of the militia units in the group in individual unit courses as required.

With the exception of the militia staff course, which is offered only in Charlottetown, the other courses and individual unit training are available also in Summerside and Montague.

promoting "energetically" the use of atomic energy for peaceful purposes. This request was inserted at the request of Vishinsky and was merely a change in wording.

2. It notes that negotiations are now going on to set up as the international agency as quickly as possible.

3. It suggests that once the agency is established, it negotiate an appropriate form of agreement with the United Nations.

This point was reworded to conform with Soviet and Indian objections to the sponsors original suggestion to have the agency set up similarly to the UN's specialized agencies.

Vishinsky agreed to the change after his reference to specialized agencies was deleted but changed his mind last Saturday and submitted one of the formal amendments defeated Tuesday.

In effect, the amendment would have made the agency subject to the Security Council veto, which was defeated 43 to 5 with 10 countries abstaining. Only the Soviet bloc voted for it.

TO CALL CONFERENCE

4. It decides that an international scientific conference be held under UN auspices to study means of developing peaceful uses of atomic energy through international co-operation.

5. It invites all UN members or agencies of the UN's specialized agencies to take part in the conference.

A Russian amendment that would have left participation open to all countries — including Red China — was defeated 36 to 5 with 18 abstentions.

6. It requests the secretary-general to consult with an advisory committee — Brazil, Canada, France, India, Russia, the U. S., and Britain — to issue invitations to the conference, to be held by next August, probably in Geneva.

Five Records For Milk Production

Mr. Max Thompson of Victoria had two very fine production records reported in a recent issue of the Holstein-Friesian Journal. Riverview Fancy Doris — 75976 — as a five year old produced 18,946 pounds of milk, 715 pounds of fat, with an average test of 3.77. This cow was fourth for Canada on twice a day milking in the 306 day division.

A daughter of this cow Aifemede Cindereau 99685 — led the two year old class for Canada on twice a day milking in the 305 day division. This heifer freshened at two years 225 days, and produced 13,526 pounds of milk, 563 pounds of fat, with an average test of 4.16.

Mr. Thompson is to be congratulated on these excellent records as these are the first cows he has had in his herd that have completed records.

Unemployment Claims Slightly Lower This Year

At last week-end the National Employment Office in Charlottetown, whose territory includes Kings and Queens Counties, had less unemployment insurance claims on hand than at the same date one year ago.

The difference was not great, 657 this year as compared to 680 on Nov. 20, 1953.

On Monday, always a day on which the most claims are filed in any given week, more than 40 claims from town and city were received by the local office. This is normal for this time of the year, and reflects the gradual onset of seasonal unemployment, with the approach of winter.

Woodmen are still being recruited by the office for lumbering at the new military camp at Gagetown, N.B., and thus far about 40 men have been sent to the base. Several companies are engaged in clearing timber off the camp site, which covers many square miles.

The more than usual amount of construction work underway in Charlottetown is attracting many applications from town and country, with applications from Charlottetown greatly outnumbering those from outside points. Forty-eight men are working on the new Federal building, and this number is gradually being increased.

A considerable number of Islanders are returning from Labrador where the summer working force is being reduced to approximately 600. The Labrador job took only about 25 per cent of the number required in the past few years.

Announce Boost In Nickel Price

TORONTO, (CP)—International Nickel Company of Canada, Ltd., Tuesday announced an increase of 4 1-2 cents (U.S.) a pound in the price of refined nickel, effective Nov. 24.

Like increases were announced by the company's United States subsidiary, International Nickel Co. Inc., and its United Kingdom subsidiary, Mond Nickel Co. Ltd.

This brings the export price of electrolytic-refined nickel from the Port Colborne, Ont., refinery to 61.2 cents U. S. a pound, including the 1 1/4 cents United States import duty which is paid by the company.

At existing exchange rates the corresponding price in Canada will be 61.4 cents a pound Canadian currency.

Labor Members To Discipline Fellows

LONDON — (Reuters) — Labor members of Parliament decided Tuesday night by a vote of 131 to 93 to ban seven colleagues from their parliamentary organization for disobeying their official leaders in a vote on German rearmament.

Further suggestion that the offenders merely should be reprimanded was understood to have been defeated by 21 votes.

Siamese Twins Have Separate Heart And Lungs

MONTREAL (CP)—Doctors have confirmed the existence of separate heart-lung systems in the Berger Siamese twins, clearing an obstacle in the path of their separation.

The twin girls, under observation at Montreal's Ste. Justine Hospital, arrived here by train last Wednesday from Rimousky, Que. They were born near the south shore St. Lawrence river centre five weeks ago.

The general condition of the twins is reported good and the smaller and weaker girl has improved in the last two days.

"There is at present no indication of the need for operation, unless an emergency arises," a hospital report said. "The surgical staff is prepared for such a possibility."

"We now have established the existence of separate digestive tracts (the stomach and intestines) and cardio-respiratory system. "The terminal part of both sternum — breastbone — are joined and this is, apparently, the only skeletal union. The liver seems continuous at the point of union.
