WHO WILL BE ON THE WINNING SIDE?

THE PATRIOT and other New Liberal newspapers are making strong efforts to induce the people here to believe that the electors of Canada are well satisfied with the Laurier-Tarte Government, and that it will be sustained in the coming elections. The Patriot really cannot be sincere; for it is not so blind as not to see the many indications pointing to the downfall of the Laurier administration. Sir Charles Tupper and the entire Conservative party throughout Canada are now united and thoroughly organized. From his own knowledge obtained by visiting many localities, and from the reports that he has received from the leading men in the various provinces, Sir Charles is able to form an accurate opinion of the prospects of the Liberal-Conservatives. We know that previous to the elections, in the year 1878, Sir Charles—then Dr. Tupper—from the political platform in the Maritime Provinces predicted that the electors were only waiting for the opportunity to vote out the McKenzie-Laurier Government. The Patriot contradicted this declaration; but the result of the elections established Dr. Tupper's prediction and showed that the Patriot was wrong. Previous to the general elections of 1882, Sir Charles assured the electors that the Conservative government would be sustained; but the Patriot again contradicted Sir Charles and again deceived the electors, for the Government was sustained by a large majority. In 1886, Sir Charles again appeared before the electors of Canada and again predicted that the Conservative government would be sustained, notwithstanding that Mercier and Laurier had raised and fanned the Riel cry. The Patriot again assured its leaders that the government would be defeated and filled its columns with untruthful telegrams with sensational headings, such as "Tories Rattled," etc., etc. The government was sustained; but owing to the misrepresentation of the Patriot this Island sent six Liberals to oppose it. It was at this election that the Patriot kept up its deception after the election by having a blackboard in front of its office for some days announcing that the Liberals had won and that the Conservatives had been defeated. In 1891, the same thing happened. Sir Charles again assured the electors of Eastern Canada that Sir John McDonald and his Conservative government would obtain a renewal of the confidence of the electors of Canada; and the Patriot revisits were again promised a Liberal victory. But, as is well-known, the people gave the renewal. Scarcely in all fair and square issues before the electors, the New Liberals, headed by Laurier and Tarte, at Ottawa, and by Greenway and Sifton, in Manitoba, entered into a conspiracy and started the Manitoba School Question in order to embarrass the Liberal-Conservative Government, and they were successful at the general election of 1896. In July of that year, they obtained power and have been in power ever since. But, during that short period of four years these New Liberals have made a most unenviable record. Since attaining power they have broken all the pledges made by them whilst in opposition, and have redeemed none. Whilst in opposition they denounced Protection; but since attaining power have adopted it. They pledged themselves to secure reciprocal trade be-

tween Great Britain and Canada; but after getting the Government they said they did not want it. They promised to obtain free trade with the United States; but after spending \$36,000 in travelling expenses, hotel bills, dinners and suppers, at which wines, whiskey and liquors of all kinds flowed freely, they dropped the negotiations, Sir Wilfred Laurier declaring that the feeling of Canada was not in favor of reciprocity. They fooled the temperance people on the prohibition question; but they still cherish the hope of obtaining the temperance people's votes, notwithstanding the deception and fraud practised. They promised a reduction in taxes; but instead they increased the taxes. They promised a reduction of the public expenditure; but increased it. They promised to keep down the public debt; but they increased it so that, in June, 1899, it had reached \$266,273,445. We do not refer here to the Yukon scandal or the election frauds which have disgraced the honest people of Canada throughout the Empire. But, we ask, is it wonderful that all fair-minded people, including many an old Liberal throughout Canada, are desirous of a change. That a change will take place at the earliest possible moment seems undoubted. If any reasonable person doubts this statement, let him ask himself these questions: Are the new Liberals as strong at the present time as the old Liberals were in 1896; are the Liberal Conservatives stronger than they were in that year? Ask the farmer who has not had the price of his produce increased or the prices of his binder twine and kerosene oil reduced as promised. Ask him where is the free trade with the United States and the American market for his produce, which Sir Louis Davies promised in accents strong and deep? Let the independent farmer speak, let the honest Liberal farmer speak, and see whether he will tell you that he intends to continue to support the Laurier-Tarte Government. Ask the hard-working man in Charlottetown who was promised cheaper kerosene oil, plenty of employment, increased wages and cheaper living,—and he will tell you of the increased price of oil, the increased cost of coal, tobacco, etc. Ask the working man whether he intends to continue his support to the Government, and wait for his reply.

It is felt here by Liberals and Conservatives, alike, that the New Liberals are not entitled to the public confidence. It is known that these new Liberals have been recreant to their duty, have sacrificed many of the best interests of the country, and have violated and trampled upon all their pre-election pledges and promises. This feeling and knowledge is not confined to the people of Prince Edward Island,—but is also to be found amongst all classes of voters, throughout the whole length and breadth of Canada; and it is the existence of this feeling that warrants Sir Charles Tupper in claiming a decisive victory on election day. Sir Richard Cartwright, the Minister of Trade and Commerce, knowing of this feeling, knowing of the violation of the party's pledges and knowing of the danger of defeat for the government, has warned the electors of Ontario that the New Liberals "are called upon to fight as they never fought before!" He knows that the government has forfeited the right of support from the old Liberals, and that the party cannot count upon it. On each occasion when they won the Liberals stood as a united body attacking a divided one. At the coming election the position will be reversed. The Conservatives are united

and have been re-inforced by very many of the Liberals who opposed them in 1896, whom the new Liberals have lost. Sir Charles Tupper, assisted by Hon. Mr. Foster and Hugh John Macdonald, and the Liberal-Conservatives in fact as well as name, have therefore every reason for believing that the Laurier-Tarte administration will be removed from power as a result of the election. The majority of the electors of this province know what to do; and we have no doubt that when the ballots are counted on election day it will be found that they are on the winning side.

THE BYE-ELECTION FRAUDS.

THE new Liberals have boasted throughout the press and country that the Government has carried the bye-elections. They have neglected, however, to inform the old Liberals that these elections were carried by a gang of political workers known as "The Machine." This gang consisted of men who were generally absolute strangers to the voters, of men without any influence in the constituency; but, as a result of their operations, most mysterious and undreamt of changes were made in the vote in every polling district in which they operated. The secret gradually leaked out, and it was found that the elections were won by fraud and ballot stealing. One of the conspirators said, on oath, that it was "cheaper to steal an election by bribing deputy returning officers to substitute fraudulent ballots for good ones than to carry a constituency by bribery." The rascality having become notorious, Mr. R. L. Borden, M. P., for Halifax, brought the Brockville and West Huron cases before Parliament, and had them referred to the Committee of Privileges and Elections, which is composed of two-thirds Liberals and one-third Conservatives. But, after some of the evidence was heard and the real state of affairs began to appear, the Government party on the committee began a policy of obstruction and succeeded to a great extent. It has been a matter of great regret that Sir Louis Davies took a prominent part in the obstruction tactics, and dictated to the prosecutor who should be called as witnesses, in what order they should be examined, and in what way he should make out his case. The result was that full inquiry was barred. But sufficient evidence was adduced to establish conclusively that the West Huron bye-election was carried by fraud, bribery, ballot-stealing and forgery. The evidence in the other case was not taken; but it is understood that, if given, it would have revealed a most terrible state of official rascality and corruption.
