SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER

From Saturday's 5 o'clock Edition.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—After the long and anxious delay since the cable to Manila was cut the authorities of the Navy Department had the satisfaction on this morning of hearing directly from the Admiral himself.

His despatch from Hong-Kong to the Government states, in brief that he succeeded by his engagement, in defeating the Spaniards and completely silencing the land batteries at Manila Bay.

Admiral Dewey adds that he cut the cable himself and is in such a position he has everything at his mercy. Owing to the small number of men carried by his fleet for landing operations, he has not been able to land a force of sufficient strength to occupy the town.

The news has caused the greatest jubilation throughout the country.

LIVERPOOL, May 7.—Steamers from the Canary Islands report that the American Consul at Las Palmas has left suddenly with plans of the harbor.

There are twelve thousand Spanish troops in Grand Canary alone.

The authorities are pushing forward fortifications and making desperate attempts to raise revenue, in some case even going so far as to take British property without giving compensation.

LONDON, May 7.—A special despatch from Vienna says: The Queen Regent has again appealed to the Emperor Francis Joseph in favor of European intervention.

The Austro Hungary foreign ministers has addressed a note to the powers on the subject.

ST. THOMAS, W. I., May 7.—It is reported that warships were seen to the southward last night.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Yesterday the consul were notified that Denmark had declared neutrality.

NEW YORK, May 7.—General Tomas Estrada Palma of the Cuban headquarters here received yesterday a communication dated April 16, from General Pedro Diaz commanding the 6th army corps in the province of Pinar del Rio, Cuba, says: "Have just received news of the suspension of hostilities on the part of the Spaniards but we continue to assume the same position. We will continue fighting till we receive orders from the government to the contrary."

During the past few days we had several successful battles, and continue operations everywhere with activity. We met several columns and fired on them. They all fled. The sugar cane is all destroyed.

NEW YORK, May 7.—A despatch from Havana, says that today American ships approached nearer to Havana than any other time since beginning the blockade.

At half past five this morning one of the cruisers sailed close into and almost in front of the El Morro battery.

The gunners promptly opened fire upon the vessel but the first shot fell short. A second shot promptly followed and this time it passed close above the vessel.

This evidently alarmed the cruiser for she immediately turned about and steamed at full speed for the fleet.

As she was retiring a number of shots were fired after her. One went very near her bows but the Spanish gunners were poor marksmen and the ships was not struck.

ON BOARD THE FLAGSHIP BROOKLYN OFF FORT MONROE May 7.—Yesterdays developments in the flying squadron would seem to indicate that Commodore Schley is one of the best and most daring strategists in the United States navy and it is expected that he will be given the first chance for action within the next few days. The cruiser Minneapolis arrived here

this afternoon and the New Orleans will be here in the morning.

These additions make a squadron of exceptional fighting ability.

The New Orleans is superior to the Columbia which has been detached for service with this squadron.

The Scorpion, with her splendid armament, helps to fill out a squadron that will give a good account of itself.

The Minneapolis is ordered to Newport News to coal immediately upon her arrival, and will be coaled to-night.

If the New Orleans gets here tomorrow, she will be coaled at once and with the addition of the Fowler as a water boat and collier, just attached, the flying squadron will be complete.

MADRID, May 7.—In a powerful speech in the Cortes Senor Moret denounced the attempt to make the Crown responsible for the existing situation.

He defended autonomy and appealed to the patriotism of nation and the chamber to assist the government the speech was enthusiastically received.

It is announced that the floating debt of Spain was increased in the month of April by 12,244,391 pesetas.

Further disorders are reported in different parts of the province, especially at Murcia, thirty miles from Cartagena where the mob, mainly striking miners, cut the telegraph lines, set fire to the town hall and law courts, burning the archives and also made an attack on the local jail, beating in the doors and releasing prisoners. Finally they interrupted railway communication with Murcia, and destroyed stores by the use of dynamite, and distributed the provisions it contained.

The situation is very serious. Recently 6000 striking Murcia miners attempted to march upon Cartagena and were only prevented by a strong force of troops.

ASSAULT CASE.

On Thursday, the 5th inst., before J. T. Mellish, A. C. Shaw and M. McPhail, J. P.'s for Queen's County, Alexander McFadyen, Allan McFadyen, Allan McMillan and Chester McMillan all of Riverdale, appeared on a charge of having assaulted and done serious bodily injury to Murdoch McLeod of the same place. The hearing took place in New Haven Hall. Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. for the prosecutor and Mr. H. J. Palmer for the defence. It seems that on the evening of the 30th of March last when all the defendants were at Allan McMillan's house, McLeod went there to get an explanation about some matter from McMillan. A dispute arose and in five or ten minutes after going in McLeod came out bleeding and with marks of violence on his head and body. The evidence showed that he was confined to his bed for several weeks after the affair. A number of witnesses on both sides were examined. The defence claimed that McLeod began the quarrel. After hearing addresses from the counsel the Magistrates discharged Chester McMillan and adjourned until Friday next the remaining defendants giving bail. A great number of spectators were present all day, and it was about 10 o'clock in the evening when the proceedings were closed.

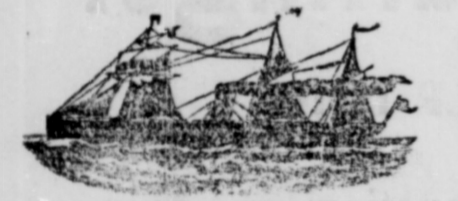

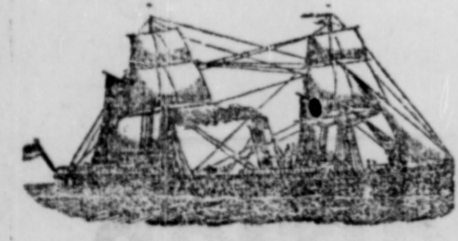
