Main Highway Nears Completion

The paved highway between Murray River and Murray Harbour will be completed this week or early next week it was learned yesterday. Approximately one mile remains to be completed which will require about 2 days. Officials estimate that about 3000 feet of this new type pavement can be laid per day, as compared with almost 1 1/2 miles of the light pavement. The basis for the new type pavement is in the gravel top road. This is pulverized by a machine to an average depth of three inches, making a fine easily workable top. The asphalt tender then precedes the pulverizer over the road spraying asphalt which is thoroughly worked in by the pulverizer. Three and sometimes more applications are made, after which the road is rolled to a compact surface.

Although this is a new experiment for the Island, this type of road has been successful in Ontario and Quebec where it has been used for many seasons under different conditions and different roads. The resulting road at Murray Harbour looks very good, and officials expect that it will give service equally as good as any other type pavement over a period of time. The completion of this road provides a through pavement from Charlottetown and western points direct to Murray Harbour, and this should have far reaching economic effects on the whole area serviced by this highway.

Twelve Acres Of Strawberries At MacIntyre Farm

Strawberry pickers will be gathering berries from 12 acres this year on the farm of the late Fred G. MacIntyre, Montague. Since the passing of Mr. MacIntyre, his sons, Bruce and Clive, have taken charge of the farm, and have conducted it well in the manner of their father.

Last year a new ten acre field was laid out, and this year together with two acres in the north field will be the picking area. This year six more new acres were laid out to be picked off next year. Approximately 5000 boxes per acre, it is expected, will be the average yield, the bulk of which will be canned at Johnson's Cannery in Montague, and the remainder will be sold to local trade with some being shipped to outside points.

About fifty pickers or more will be hired during the height of the season, and picking is expected to get underway next week. The large number of varieties grown at the MacIntyre farm include nine acres of Dunlop and the remainder of Murray, Midlands, Premier, Dresden and Spankle.

Besides carrying on this new industry, in which they have been engaged commercially for the past six years, they also carry on large farming operations in grain, hay, and potatoes with over sixty acres being cultivated. Large quantities of straw are required to cover the berry rows for the winter, and this is derived from the farm, which employs four to five steady employees from spring to fall.

The present price of berries, under daily fluctuations, is 30 cents to the grower, and 35 cents to the consumer locally. Without doubt this farm is one of the largest strawberry production farms. It has been the centre of attraction every summer for countless visitors from the U. S. A. and central Canada, who have commented favorably on the extensive strawberry cultivation carried on at the MacIntyre Farm.

Early Visitors In Large Numbers

Present indications point to one of the greatest tourist seasons this Province has ever enjoyed, if the number of early visitors in June can be used as any criterion. Visitors also came from every one of the 10 Canadian Provinces and from the Northwest Territories, Scotland, England, Holland and Australia.

There were teachers and ranchers, soldiers, airmen, C.W.A.C., grocers, printers, veterinarians, bandmen, nurses, a ship's master and a labor conciliator, lawyers, clergymen, doctors, artists, librarians and a bacteriologist.

Valleyfield Road Under Construction

Matheson and MacMillan, contracting firm, have begun constructing the new Valleyfield road over a distance of approximately two miles. The new road will begin about 1/2 mile from the crossroads at the southern limits of the town of Montague, and end at the road leading from Valleyfield to Kilmuir.

Throughout its length it will be widened to 66 feet from ditch to ditch and have a 32 foot top which will later be gravelled. Instead of following the old road with its many curves, the new road will run directly in front of the residence of Mr. Les Gay, down a small grade, and then straighten out to run directly to Sutherland's bridge.

From there the new road will cut directly through property owned by John Keith and Earl Keith, joining the old road about 100 yards up from the turn. It will then follow the old road to the finish point.

Already preliminary work of stumping and clearing the road sides has been completed. At present low places are being filled in, after which the ditching will take place and the road top formed.

It is felt that on completion the road level will be of sufficient height to prevent snow lodging. Together with the new wide bridge which was erected at Sutherland's last year, this road will serve a large farming area, not only during the summer season, but throughout the whole year.
