

# Newfoundland Plans To Complete Through Road

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood Wednesday announced the provincial government has signed a contract for construction of a road to bridge the last remaining land gap in the Newfoundland section of the Trans-Canada Highway.

At present no road exists between Alexander Bay and Port Blandford, about 25 miles across a corner of the northeast coast. Motorists crossing the island must load their cars on a railway car between Clarendville and Gumbo.

Mr. Smallwood said the contractor, Concrete Products Limited, will begin immediately to move equipment into Traytown, near Alexander Bay, and into Newsum Sound along the route so work "can be proceeding in two places at the one time."

A local branch road connects Alexander Bay with Glovertown and Traytown.

ENDS AT CHARLOTTETOWN

The new section will bypass the Trans-Canada Highway route proposed originally and covers the shortest distance between the present terminal at Alexander Bay and an existing network of roads on Burin Peninsula. It will terminate at Charlottetown on Clode Sound. A ferry across the one-mile stretch of water will connect with the Bonavista highway at Bunyan's Cove.

Mr. Smallwood said it is intended to have the road completed by next year—1937—will be possible to drive all the way from St. John's to Port aux Basques with the exception of one gap of less than one mile . . . between Charlottetown and Bunyan's Cove in Clode Sound.

"A suitable ferry will be placed on that gap next year and it will continue to operate for about a year until the road is completed from Charlottetown to Port Blandford." Port Blandford is at the head of the sound.

"In the meantime we are building a road from Bunyan's cove, on the south side of Clode Sound, up to Port Blandford and hop to get through before the end of the present year," Mr. Smallwood said.

OTTAWA TO PAY

"For the whole of that distance, namely, from Traytown to Bunyan's Cove, our hope is that the road will be operating through the national park. We have not yet decided to pass title to this area over to the Government of Canada so that the government can develop the national park in this area, but we are in strong hopes that we may be able to do so."

"If a national park is developed in this area between Bunyan's Cove and Glovertown-Traytown it will mean not only that this part of Newfoundland will be developed at considerable cost by the Government of Canada and create considerable employment, but also the return of the full cost of the road to the Newfoundland government from Ottawa."

"Once this road is completed a paving program will be launched and a program of shortening the distance by eliminating great curves and sweeps will be commenced, so that it should be possible to reduce the road to about 600 miles in all."
