## New Railway Dry Dock At Geo'town Opened Tuesday

The new railway dry dock at Georgetown was officially opened yesterday by Premier A. W. Matheson, when Captain Willie White, Murray Harbor, very capably placed his schooner, the Ethel and Nelle, in the cradle which

was then drawn up to the dry dock. Work on the dry dock was started last summer by the Crandall Dry Dock Engineers of Cambridge, Mass. Mr. Paul Crandall being in charge.

The overall length of the dock track is one hundred feet of concrete and two hundred and seventy five feet of timber, which are both placed on piles for the full 375 feet. It is extended out into ten feet of water at high tide, the cradle following the rails into the water, in which position the vessel sails into the cradle and is then drawn into position. The power is supplied by a fifteen H.P. electric motor.

The track is built on the arc of a circle so that the keel blocks will have a declivity of two feet in length when submerged, and be horizontal in the upper position for transfer. It was designed mainly to provide facilities for immediate maintenance for draggers, eliminating the necessity of travelling to Pictou, N. S. for dry dock, and will take a ship up to one hundred tons displacement. It is also designed with an eye

to the future, so that vessels can be transferred to shore for winter storage. All that is required is the construction of tracks and transfer cradles at the site.

The dock was constructed at a cost of approximately \$70,000. The Federal Government paying \$20,000.00, plus the dredging cost of \$12,000.00 with the provincial government financing the remainder.

Its location is ideal, as Georgetown is considered as one of the top seven harbors on the Atlantic coast. Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, minister of Fisheries, introduced Premier Matheson, followed by Messrs. G. E. Saville, M. L. A., S. S. Hessian, M. L. A. and P. L. Boudreau, Mayor of Georgetown. The dignitaries as a whole, voiced the opinion that they were well pleased that this project had come to Georgetown, and was one election promise that was well carried out. Mayor Boudreau also said that this time, Georgetown instead of being last, was first. He expressed his thanks on behalf of the citizens.

**OTHERS PRESENT**  
Among those present in the

enthusiastic crowd were, Messrs. R. H. Nicholson, who was instrumental in laying the ground-work in facts and figures for this project; John H. England, who constructed the cradle Willard Burke who did the electrical work, and P. A. Murnaghan, Deputy Minister of Fisheries, who was agent in charge of the project.

The dry dock engineers who constructed the work have been in business for five generations, and have built dry docks in many countries, including Canada, U. S., Tahiti, Europe and the Near East. Mr. Carndall's parents were native Nova Scotians.

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### Gov't. Replies To Montague Paving Request

At the regular monthly meeting of the Montague Town Council Monday night, the main topics for discussion were two letters in reply

to requests made to the Provincial Government by the Town Council in regard to the surfacing of the highway between Montague and Wood Islands.
