The New Onion Culture.

The Connecticut experiment station thus sums up the advantages of the transplanting method of growing onions: This method insures a clean crop, even upon smutty land.

The increase in the size and quality of the crop, the earlier ripening, and the lessened expense incident to the care of the plants after transplanting offset in a measure the cost and labor of raising and transplanting the seedlings.

C. W. Walton, justice of the supreme court of Maine, will soon retire after a service of 40 years.

Henry Austin Adams, formerly an Episcopal cleric, has become editor of Donahoe's Magazine of Boston.

Professor Charles Elliot Norton of Harvard has been made president of the Arts and Crafts society, which was organized in Boston the other day.

President David Starr Jordan of Stanford university has succeeded in raising the funds required to establish a zoological garden in San Francisco.

Dr. Karl Peters, the German explorer, is a man of about 40, below the average height, with red hair and blue eyes and an expression not pleasing, his face being marred with scars.

Ex-President Harrison while in Chicago refused to give a reporter a photograph of his little daughter and said that he did not intend to have her picture printed in any newspaper.

Ex-Lieutenant Governor Hanna of Indiana has taken his children out of the public schools of Indianapolis because, as he said, "the histories now in use teach that Lee was a greater general than Grant."

Milton Cushing Phillips, the new United States district attorney for the eastern district of Wisconsin, is the son of a Maine lumberman and was at one time a station agent on the Green Bay, Winona and St. Paul railroad.

M. Mannheim's claim of 287,000 francs for cataloguing the Spitzer collection was cut down one-half by a Paris court, which has just awarded him 150,000 francs, declaring that the usual 3 per cent commission was manifestly excessive.

Edoardo A. Gilson, who has just died in the City of Mexico, was one of the secretaries of the Emperor Maximilian. Later, under the republic, he served as Mexican secretary of legation in England and still later in the United States. He was an author of no small merit.

It is said that President McKinley never walks with any one unless that person is in his confidence, and in proof of this the following remark of an Ohio man who knows the president well is cited. Said he, "I'd rather walk with President McKinley than be a member of his cabinet."

The Rev. William H. Noyes has resigned as a missionary in Japan of the American board on the ground that he is uncertain whether he believes some of the doctrines inculcated by the board. It was his avowal of a belief in probation after death that brought about the famous controversy over that question in the board some years ago.

The real name of Colonel Smolenski, the gallant Greek commander, is Constantine Smolentz, and he comes of Dalmatian stock. His father took part in the war of independence, settled at Athens and married a Greek lady. Constantine, besides possessing strategical abilities of a high order, is endowed with great physical courage.

The veteran of the consular service is Horatio J. Sprague, who has been our representative at Gibraltar since 1848. If Mr. Sprague lives till a year from next May, he will have had the honor of being an American consul at one place for half a century. He was born at Gibraltar, but was appointed from Massachusetts. Mr. Sprague gets a salary of \$1,500 a year.

OUR ENGLISH COUSINS.

London has an army of 100,000 pick-pockets.

The thieves of England steal \$8,000,000 worth of property every year.

The London policeman, on an average, arrests seven persons every year.

Between 2,000 and 2,500 English convicts are discharged yearly on tickets of leave.

No fewer than 26,326 doors and windows in London have been found open at night by the police in one year.

Of the prisoners received at Pentonville under sentences of hard labor, about one-half are unfit for such labor, and are exempted from it upon medical grounds.

The well known safe deposit in Chancery lane, London, frequently contains deeds, documents, notes, bills and jewels to the stupendous value of \$50,000,000.

The Royal Irish constabulary is the only police force in the kingdom which is practically on a military footing, the members of which are drilled and disciplined as soldiers.

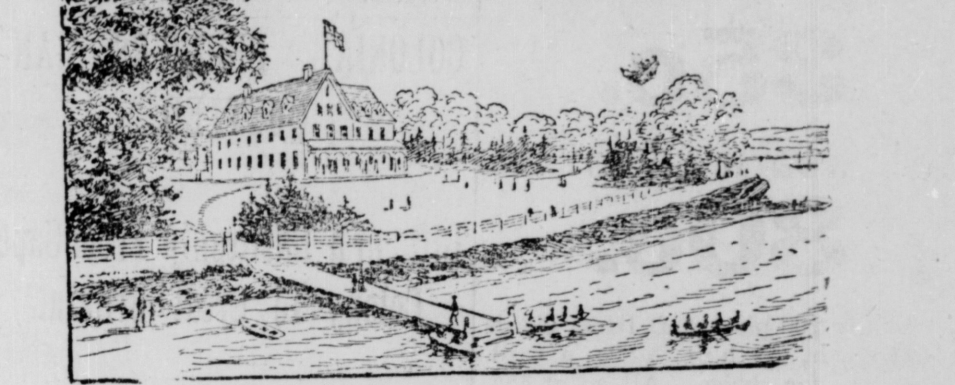
