DEATH OF D. M'KAY, ESQ.

We deeply regret to hear that Donald McKay, Esq., ex-M. P., died at his home at Oyster Bay Bridge, this morning after a short illness. Mr. McKay was a prominent merchant and farmer, and few men were better known throughout the Province or more generally esteemed. He was a staunch Liberal-Conservative, and sat in the Provincial Legislature for several parliaments as the representative of the First Electoral District of Queen's County, and was ever forward in the promotion of the best interests of the Province. His death is regretted by hosts of friends and acquaintances.

CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE.

During the past five months of the fiscal year which began on the 1st July last, the total value of goods entered for consumption in Canada has been \$45,650,000, of which \$23,784,300 were dutiable, \$19,329,900 free, and \$2,535,800 coin. As the five months ending with November last were the busiest months of the season, it may be concluded that Canada's import trade for the past fiscal year will be smaller than usual. As the Gazette points out, a notable feature of the returns is that the decrease has occurred principally in dutiable goods. In the months of July, August and September last, for instance, the value of dutiable merchandise entered for consumption was only \$15,288,000, as against \$19,889,800 in the corresponding period of the preceding year, showing a falling off of nearly \$4,600,000; whereas in the first quarter of the present fiscal year, the import of free goods, exclusive of coin and bullion, was \$12,275,000, as compared with \$12,767,700 in 1893. In view of the fact that the free list comprises chiefly raw materials to be worked up in Canada, and such necessities of life as tea, coffee and sugar, the maintained volume of free imports may fairly be taken as indicative of comparatively active industry within the country, and of unimpaired consumptive demand. But if there has been a decrease in imports, there has been a very notable increase in the export trade during the five months beginning with July 1st. In that period, according to the returns, there has been shipped abroad Canadian produce to the value of \$66,834,230, foreign produce to the value of \$3,929,400, and coin to the value of \$559,640, giving an aggregate trade in merchandise alone of \$67,323,270. To appreciate the significance of these figures, says the Gazette, it is only necessary to recall the fact that in the twelve months ending June 30th, 1893, the total value of Canadian produce exported was only \$62,431,000, or very little more than has been sent abroad in the last five months. Even in 1892, the value of Canadian exports was not more than \$77,755,700, and not until 1893 did the export trade attain a value of one hundred millions. There is every indication that the full fiscal year ending next June, will show an export business in Canadian products of more than \$100,000,000.

CANADIAN MAY IN ENGLAND.

Good Canadian hay has achieved a reputation among persons in London who control and work large studs of horses. Of course the price is rather against it just now, but there is no doubt that its quality will always ensure a ready sale if the prices are such as to tempt Canadian dealers to send it over. For some little time it appeared as though a prejudice was forming in England against Canadian hay, but it arose from the fact that inferior Russian and River Plate hay was being mixed with Canadian, rebaled and sold as the Canadian article. This, however, was soon found out, and speaking generally, it may safely be said that Canadian hay enjoys an excellent reputation in the United Kingdom. A statement appeared in the United States and Canadian papers not long ago that the British Government had ordered a large consignment of compressed fodder from the United States for, it was presumed, the army horses. The consignment, however, was found to be made of bricks, consisting of crushed oats, maize and clover hay, finely pressed into bricks by means of hydraulic presses. It was stated that as a result of the order in question the United States papers anticipated that a large trade would be opened up with Great Britain. The question was naturally asked how it was that Canada had been overlooked, and the enquiry was certainly justifiable. It would appear, however, that the statement in question was entirely without foundation. A London correspondent reports that nothing is known at the War office of any order having been given for compressed fodder from the United States. Canadians may rest assured, therefore, that the Dominion has not been overlooked, and it is safe to say that, all things being equal, the War office would prefer to get any fodder that they might import from a British possession, rather than from a foreign supply.

AN OMISSION SUPPLIED.

Sir,—In your able review of the events of the old year, you have certainly overlooked the, to us, important one of the appointment of a new Lieutenant-Governor to fill the place vacated by the death of Governor Carvell, whose death you notice. THE BLENHEIM ARRIVES.

Very Imposing Ceremonies at Halifax Yesterday.

Great Crowds of People Witness the Landing From the Ship.

HALIFAX, Jan. 2.

The warship Blenheim arrived in the harbor and dropped anchor shortly before noon yesterday. The landing of the remains of the Fenian was to have taken place at twelve, but was postponed until two o'clock. Rain was falling in torrents and continued throughout the afternoon. At two o'clock thousands of people returned to their places on the wharf. The rain was falling more heavily than in the forenoon, but the people were indifferent to the weather. The crowds stood, and were content to get drenched and chilled to their bones.

After the transport Lilly had been drawn up alongside the Blenheim, the firing of minute guns on the ship began. Then the ship's band was heard playing the Dead March, and the coffin, still covered by the Canadian flag and bearing upon it the Queen's wreath and crucifix, was lowered carefully over the side.

Meanwhile the sides of the transport had been lined with marines from the Blenheim. Standing with reversed arms the effect on shore was magical. The heads were uncovered in the pouring rain, and the people pressed down to the edge of the wharves.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen went to the utmost point on the landing at the Ordnance Yard and strained their eyes in the direction of the spectacle at the side of the ship. The music floated in over the water like the sobbing of the sea through the pelting rain. Exactly at fifteen minutes after two the transport pushed away from the Blenheim's side and steered toward Ordnance Yard. The guard of honor was drawn up and the officers stood at the landing ready to receive the remains.

On arriving at the Ordnance Wharf, the sailors placed the coffin on the gun carriage in waiting and the procession to the Provincial Building was commenced, headed by the band of the King's Regiment, which played the Dead March in Saul and Beethoven's Funeral March.

The guard of honor was composed of 300 Imperial troops. The streets through which the procession passed were lined by the 63rd regiment. At the Provincial Building the remains were placed on a castrisque in the Legislative Council chamber, which had been exquisitely draped in purple and black and decorated with a magnificent display of floral tributes. The coffin was carried from the gun carriage on the shoulders of twelve sergeant-majors, soldiers with fixed bayonets standing at each end of the casket.

The body of Sir John Thompson was removed last night to the residence of John Pugh, where Lady Thompson is stopping. It was returned to the Council Chamber early this morning, and will lie in state till 8 o'clock to-night. On Thursday morning the body will be removed to St. Mary's Cathedral, where a requiem mass will begin at 9.30. The funeral procession will leave the cathedral at 11 o'clock.

Most of the members of the Canadian Government are here or are en route for Halifax. The governors and prime ministers of all the provinces are here or are coming.

OTTAWA, Jan. 2. A special train for Halifax left at ten o'clock last night. On board were Hon. Messrs. Haggart, Patterson and Wallace, members of the Government; Speaker White; A. Bishop, Dolan, Judge Burbridge, Senator Sullivan, Messrs. McKay, Cargill, Metcalf, Carby, Hodgins, Boyd, Coatsworth, Bryson, Cochrane and Gillet, M. P's., Deputy Ministers Newcombe and Paret and Mr. Langstaff, Clerk of the Senate. A detachment of Dominion police, under Sergeant Slade, was also on board.
