VE-Day Service At Miscouche Yesterday

VE-Day was fittingly observed yesterday at Miscouche when, under the auspices of the Miscouche Branch of the Canadian Legion, joined by members from the Summerside Branch, a memorial service was held in the church at 3:30 in the afternoon.

The ceremony was attended by His Honor Lt-Governor J. A. Bernard and Mrs. Bernard, Lt-Col. P. S. Fielding, Aide de Camp to the Lt-Governor, His Worship Henry W. Wedge and Mrs. Wedge.

To the strains of a military march, the members of the Legion sang the church and were welcomed by the parish priest, Rev. J. D. Kelly.

Father Kelly said that they were gathered together to pay a small tribute to the young men of the parish who had given their lives in the defence of freedom.

He welcomed the distinguished guests and the Legion members and to the parents of those who had fallen in battle, he said they should be proud to be the fathers and mothers of those who had so bravely given their all in so worthy a cause.

Lt-Governor Bernard said "today we celebrate VE-day and to some of the younger folk it may have little significance. To you men and women who served and fought in the last war it is the anniversary of that day five years ago when the German armies collapsed and actual fighting ceased.

It is well for us to remember those victorious events of five years ago. It is well to rehearse them from time to time and to bring to posterity their meaning which has meant so much to the world and to mankind. It is fitting, indeed, and it is fitting to remind you all again of the glorious deeds of those who made the celebration of VE-Day possible. I congratulate the members of the Miscouche Branch for the very fine programme prepared for this event and I commend the spirit of co-operation which has always existed in this thriving village of Miscouche."

A vote of thanks to His Honor Lt-Governor Bernard and to Mayor Wedge by the pupils of the Notre Dame Convent was responded to by Mayor Wedge. After expressing his appreciation of the honor of the invitation, Mayor Wedge said that he wished to take the opportunity of congratulating Father Kelly and the Sisters, as well as the members of the Legion, who were responsible for arranging the splendid memorial service.

"May I also," he continued, "express the feeling of pleasure we feel in having in our midst the Lt-Governor, who is ever ready to assist in functions such as we have here today.

"Canada is today one of the great nations because its people are willing to toil, to pioneer, and to sacrifice, even to the extent of giving their lives, for an ideal of government that has been found practical and good by the test of years.

"Those who have given their lives, our fallen heroes, will be forever remembered."

At the conclusion of his address Mayor Wedge presented to the Miscouche Legion, of which he is honorary president, a portrait of Winston Churchill, "who," he concluded, "showed such tenacity and courage and undying faith during the darkest days of the war and has been such an inspiration to us all."

During the ceremony the pupils of the Convent sang very pleasingly several choruses and at the conclusion the parents of the fallen heroes laid wreaths on the side altar, after which the distinguished guests and members of the Legion dropped poppies before the plaque bearing the names of the boys of the parish who were being honored by the memorial service.
