Large amounts of clothing and furniture were also collected for Souris fire victims. The spiritual convener, Mrs.

Joseph Campbell, reported that members received corporate communion on April 26th, the Feast of Our Patroness, spent hours of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament on the first Friday of each month, attended study clubs and attended the women's retreat last May. Mrs. J.B. St. John, convener of ways and means, gave a fine report on the many fund raising projects held during the year. The press convener Mrs. M. McQuaid, reported that many articles were sent to local and Catholic press and that a member was privileged to have an article accepted and published in "The Canadian League Magazine". Mrs. Joseph Paquet, convener of membership, reported an increase in membership over last year. Mrs. J.P. MacPhee, convener of T.V. and movies, reported having written to CBC-TV commending them for pleasing programs and requesting others. Mrs. J.J. MacCormac reported many visits to sick and shut-ins, cards to new mothers and gifts to sick at Christmas. Convener of the four rural units of the council gave their respective reports. These small groups had raised large amounts of money, all of which were spent for charitable and parish work.
