

Nfld. To Be Represented At Live Fox And Mink Exhibition

Prince Edward Island's annual live Fox and Mink Show gets underway this morning when Mr. Parvin Cass of Summerside begins judging some 120 foxes which will be shown by such well known fur breeders as George Calbeck, Summerside; Ernest Mill, Kensington; Lloyd Lockerby, Hamilton; Loewell Hancock, Summerside.

Although the Province was once famous for its export of fox pelts the number of live foxes being raised today is small. Those that are being kept however are of a very high quality and could conceivably be the nucleus of a revived industry should myriads of fancy turn to the long haired furs once more.

The mink judging will begin tomorrow morning and if necessary will continue through Saturday. The fur show will be held at the Exhibition Pavilion at the Exhibition Grounds, Charlottetown.

For a while it was a question whether Great Tom would not permanently replace its more famous rival. During its performance as understudy it won many admirers who insisted Tom was "sweeter" than Ben.
