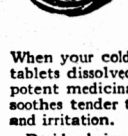

## Fire Raging At Vancouver Dock

VANCOUVER, March 2—(CP)—Fire was raging uncontrolled yesterday at the British Columbia Packers, Ltd., steamship dock at the foot of Campbell Avenue, about five miles from the city centre.

Two fire barges were playing water on the structure, and the City Fire Department rushed five pieces of equipment to the scene. There were no immediate reports of injuries.

An unidentified freighter was forced to lift anchor and small fishing craft docked nearby drew out into the open water.

Firemen were fighting to prevent the blaze from spreading to industrial buildings in the congested vicinity.

## Wage Increase For Loggers In B. C.

VANCOUVER, March 2—(CP)—An 18-month contract providing for a basic wage increase of nine cents an hour has been accepted by British Columbia coastal loggers, members of the International Woodworkers of America (C. I. O.).

The contract increases the basic wage to \$1.29 1-2 an hour, plus differential raises of one to nine cents an hour, depending on present wage category. It also contains a cost-of-living clause.

The I.W.A.'s coastal division has a membership of 32,000.

## Triplets Born To Couple In Quebec

CACOUNA, Que., March 2—(CP)—Triplets—all boys—were born here recently to Mrs. Charles Rioux of this south shore community 130 miles east of Quebec.

The triplets weighed about 3 1-2 pounds each at birth. Mother and children were reported doing well.

Rioux, a wood-chopper, and Mrs. Rioux have four other children, two boys and two girls.

## Woman Cabinet Member Resigns

CANBERRA, March 2—(Reuters)—Australia's only woman cabinet minister, Dame Enid Lyons, has resigned for health reasons, Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies announced yesterday.

She was vice-president of the executive council.

Mrs. Lyons, a Liberal, is the widow of former Prime Minister Joseph Lyons. She is 53.

She was elected Australia's first woman member of Parliament in 1943, and became the first woman to become a cabinet member in December, 1949.

## Woman Occupies Speaker's Chair In Ontario House

TORONTO, March 2—(CP)—Precedent was shattered yesterday when Agnes Macphail became the first woman to preside over the deliberations of the Ontario Legislature.

It was the first time in Ontario's history that a woman occupied the Speaker's chair. The speaker, Rev. M. C. Davies, extended the invitation to Miss Macphail, C.C.F. member for York East, to preside during this afternoon's debate.

As far as is known, the only other woman who has ever occupied a Speaker's chair in a Canadian Legislature is Mrs. Nancy Hodges, Speaker of the British Columbia Legislature.

## Three Soldiers Held On Robbery Charge

KINGSTON, Ont., March 2—(CP)—Three soldiers were arrested on armed robbery charges yesterday after a midnight-to-dawn taxi ride. They were accused of stealing an estimated \$36 from a taxi driver at gunpoint and of tying him to a tree at nearby Gananoque.

Taken into custody in the taxi here were two men who gave their names as Pte. Lawrence Madden and Pte. William Maccaife, both stationed at nearby Barrfield Barracks. Arrested at a police roadblock at Cornwall, Ont., was the other man, identified as Raymond Morgan, 23, of Roslyn, Ont.

## Ban On Natural Rubber Will Not Limit Sports Goods

CHICOPEE, Mass., March 2—(AP)—How will the American sportsman fare under the Government's new edict curtailing use of natural rubber in 47,000 products. At present it looks as if he won't have to forego any of his athletic activities in 1951 for lack of sports equipment.

Luther E. Coleman, Vice-President of the leader in the sporting goods industry, A. G. Spalding and Bros., sums it up like this:

"I feel that we can operate with these new percentages allowed under the rubber order."

That order, issued Monday by the National Production Authority, limits the use of natural rubber to 85 per cent in golf balls, 10 per cent in baseball centres, 81 per cent in tennis balls, and 83 per cent in inflatable athletic balls such as footballs and basketballs.

Coleman, a member of the Industry Group which sat in on Government meetings concerning the rubber order, says that the natural rubber percentages allowed "approximate" those now being used in golf balls and the others mentioned.

"With the new order, we'll be allowed to continue production of most of our rubber items, but the over-all production will be limited to the monthly allowance of rubber permitted by the N. P. A.," Coleman says.

It looks as if golfing suffers won't be able to blame their 90-yard drives on the equipment—not this year.

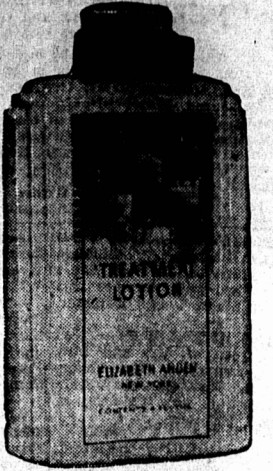
