**MAINE FISHERIES COUNCIL FORMED**  
PORTLAND, Me. (AP)—A council of Maine fisheries was organized here Monday by representatives of the Maine Lobstermen's Association, Coastal Seiners and Weirmen's Association and Associated Fisheries of Maine. Ronald Green, commissioner of the sea and shore fisheries department, acted as chairman of the meeting. Benjamin Thompson, Portland lawyer and secretary of the Associated Fisheries of Maine, was acting secretary. Thompson said the meeting "may mark a milestone in the fishing industry in Maine as it rears before which all facets of the industry can come in and be heard." He said the new council will speak for nearly the entire Maine fishing industry.

**LAST OBSTRUCTION OUT OF CANAL**  
CAIRO (AP)—Two floating cranes of the UN salvage fleet towed the frigate Abukir Monday and restored a clear channel throughout the 103-mile of the Suez Canal. The Abukir was towed away to a ship graveyard in the Bitter Lakes. Only an Egyptian announcement now is needed to open the canal to all vessels adapted to its 24-foot depth. The Egyptian Middle East News Agency said this will come today. The present limit is 10,000 tons. Ships up to four times that size have used the canal in the past. The Abukir, a 1,400-ton Egyptian warship, was sunk near the south end during the fighting last fall.

### Police Report No Serious Offences In Month Of March

No serious offences were reported by the Charlottetown Police Force during the month of March. This is seen in the monthly report of the Chief of Police, C. W. MacArthur, submitted at last night's regular meeting of the City Council. Out of 52 persons arrested for being drunk and incapable, there were two dismissals. Eleven persons were charged with being drunk and disorderly and out of this number three were dismissed. Three persons were convicted of driving whilst impaired. Each received a fine of \$100. One person was charged with mischief and will be tried in a higher court. One person was convicted of resisting arrest and seven out of eight charged with vagrancy served jail terms.

In the traffic department, four were convicted for failing to stop at a red traffic light. A speeder received the usual fine and a person charged with driving a motor vehicle and splashing another had his case dismissed. Four motor vehicles were reported stolen. All of these were recovered. Of the three bicycles reported stolen two of them were returned to their owners. There were 36 burial permits issued during the month. During March 45 transients received overnight lodging in jail.

Traffic violations resulted in \$40 income to the Department. Dog licenses brought in \$22 and motor rentals, \$22.50. No absenteeism through sickness was reported on the force.

### C. P. R. Plans To Close All Three Of Its Hotels In N. S.

HALIFAX (CP)—The CPR plans to close its three hotels in Nova Scotia, Eric W. Balcom (L-Kings North) reported in the legislature Monday night.

He said he understands the CPR is ready to sell the 100-room Cornwallis Inn at Kentville for conversion into an apartment block and dispose of the 175-room Pines Hotel at Digby and the 65-room Lakeside Inn at Yarmouth at the end of the summer season. The Cornwallis Inn is open all year. The others are summer hotels. All three are on the main line of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, a CPR subsidiary.

Mr. Balcom said their closing would be "a serious blow to the tourist industry of Nova Scotia." He urged the provincial government to take steps to keep the hotels open. Mr. Balcom is proprietor of the Farmout Hotel at Wolfville, near Kentville. All three hotels are said to have lost business in recent years because of declining train travel and stiffer competition from motels and other roadside accommodations.

Mr. Balcom said the Cornwallis Inn has had an occupancy rate of only 40 per cent for the last year or two.

He said closing of the Cornwallis Inn would hit at the economy of Kentville, a town of 5,000, and hamper the tourist trade through the Annapolis Valley. The hotel spent about \$10,000 in the town annually for supplies and staff.

Trade Minister Manson said his department has made inquiries about the CPR plans.
