CHINA'S FOOD CRISIS

Farm Failure Halts Industrial Progress

The National People's Congress (which is the parliament of Communist China) has been in session in Peking. It is the first meeting for two years, though, according to the constitution, congress should meet every year to hear and discuss the report of the government on progress and on policy. It was held in complete secrecy. Nothing has been published, except that the customary report was, as usual, made by the Premier Mr. Chou En-Lai.

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REPORT

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The Chamber is opposed—may become necessary in the country's development. At any rate, all the political parties are making bids for support at this time in the election of more social security. It is a question of degree, not of kind. The private enterprise system as we know it years ago has gone by the board in Canada and in practically every country where it flourished. The Scandinavian countries are a striking example in this respect, and Britain is not far behind.

The Board of Trade of Metropolitan Toronto has just rejected the Chamber's campaign. While agreeing with the aims of the project, it objects strongly to its methods. Especially objectionable, it finds, is the phase of the operation which is directed at school children.

Mr. Claude Jodoin, president of the Canadian Labor Congress, has denounced the Chamber for trying to import Mercurianism into Canada and lumping socialism and Communism together in attacking the welfare state. Mr. T.C. Douglas, too, has gotten involved in the controversy, linking the Chamber's activities with one of the signs of the emergence of "neo-fascism" in North America.

One does not need to hold socialist views to realize that a campaign of this kind invites counter-measures equally unfortunate from the standpoint of the public interest. It would be a poor service to "freedom" to insist on continuing it.

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This advice may not be acceptable to modern authorities but it contains many sound suggestions. Dr. Legault did not believe in the infant school system of the adult. These are ideas that ought to be seen for good mental health by encouraging independence and feeling of security.

Many children in large families are treated as "units" rather than as individuals. The parents are busy to devote time to each child. This means that the youngsters must find their own resources.

The younger children are cared for by their older sisters or brothers, who treats the little ones as human beings without fussing about them. This is what is meant by the saying "Children in large families are not spoiled." The only child gets the attention and affection but also runs the risk of being overprotected and not allowed to work out his own destiny.

The wide parent, regardless of the size of the family, will do well to heed the words of the occasion arises, help him to overcome more difficult and trying periods of his life.

HIVES AFTER BATHING

R.C. writes: For six years I have not been able to take a bath without becoming covered with hives. They itch a lot and last about an hour after the bath. Have you any suggestions?

REPLY: This may be a physical allergy to heat or to cold or sensitivity to an ingredient in the soap or bath towel. Skin tests would be needed to uncover the culprit.

W.B. writes: Could drinking a lot cause the abdomen to blow up with gas?

REPLY: Alcohol is absorbed in the stomach and does not form gas. But it may contribute to the problem. Abdominal swelling is not always caused by gas. It may be due to the accumulation of bile and occasionally stems from fluid if the alcoholic has cirrhosis of the liver.

J.D. writes: I had a double pneumonia in the spring. How often can I expect to get it again?

REPLY: There are no limits to the number of pneumonia bouts a person can have. But one attack is far the course.

LOW BLOOD PRESSURE

E.P. writes: When the blood pressure goes low, what 3 P.ptoms does the person have?
