"We suggest that wherever possible the help and assistance of provincial and local organizations be sought both for guidance and for actually carrying out the program."

"We suggest that our regional high schools be studied with a view to developing them into centers of cultural, educational and recreational activity for adults."

"We suggest that the government and the division of adult education should consider this program as a major project and conduct research into possible approaches to the problem."

"We suggest that new ideas and new methods."

MAJOR PROBLEM

"The major problem is the lack of a major program 'during the first year or two' of the program in the province that is to stimulate interest in learning. 'We feel,' the association said, 'that this should be done by the use of radio, television, newspapers and publications in the adult education division.'

"The association suggested that the program of vocational training be given 'serious thought to the financial support of a broad program of vocational training as the program develops. Government will come to feel as well as the private sector, and areas are coming to feel that adult education is an essential part of the program of adult university training."

Brazil Refuses Invasion Aid

WASHINGTON (CP) - Brazil's government has refused to support an invasion of Cuba by the United States.

President Kennedy has been asked by some right-wing extremists to support an invasion of Cuba by the United States.

In a statement issued by the Brazilian government, it says it supports a blockade to prevent offensive weapons reaching Cuba but not invasion.

Brazil, it said, "does not lend its support to acts that violate the territorial integrity of an independent country."

For that reason, the embassy statement continued, Brazil declined to support one portion of the 20-country Organization of American States last Tuesday. This portion authorized use of armed force for measures which Brazil interpreted as "implying an intervention of Cuban territory."
