Let's Talk It Over by "G"

Supposing we were to take a few days to teach some youngster to learn to skate, and managed to get him to the point where he could stay on his feet, but he did not attempt to skate any more that winter, wouldn't you say that my efforts had been largely wasted? Well, that's what happens sometimes in the teaching of spelling. If pupils are taught words they will have no further occasion to use them in their written work, unless they are "quiz kids" material, they will naturally forget a large percentage of these words. That's why graded spellers have been introduced into the schools. So that pupils may learn each year that words suited to their grade, the words which they will be using over and over again in that grade.

Unfortunately this practice, or in most of such cases it may be called rote learning, does not bring the desired results, and pupils come up to the senior grades without having mastered satisfactorily the simple words that people use every day in their writing. Even then, it would seem the sensible thing to make sure that they learn these words first, before they start learning the larger and less-used words. The words used more often by everybody should be placed on a higher priority basis than the unfamiliar ones which the pupils will have little or no occasion to use when they go into the social and business worlds. It is little use crowding those "jaw-breakers" at the students when their more immediate need is to learn the common words. It is like putting a milk coat on a woman who has no shoes to wear.

Cases Heard In Supreme Court At Summerside

The appeal of Joseph Gallant of Summerside against a conviction of unlawful sale of intoxicating liquor last May was granted at a special sitting of the Supreme Court in Summerside yesterday. His Honor Mr. Justice George M. MacDonald, Q.C., of Charlottetown represented the appellant.

Three witnesses gave evidence for the Crown, Cst. William J. Leach, R.C.M.P., Vance Muirbridge, Summerside, and Wendall Mann, Kensington. Mr. Gallant gave evidence on his own behalf.

The charge arose from a seizure of six bottles of ale by Cst. Leach and Cst. P.J. Borys on the night of March 16th, 1955, from a car parked on Water Street in which Muirbridge and Mann were passengers. Failure of the crown witnesses to identify Mr. Gallant as the party from whom the ale was purchased was the reason given by the court for allowing the appeal.

In the case of appellant Robert Gallant, 16, of Borden against a sentence of six months in jail and assessment of \$25.00 damages, imposed by Magistrate E.H. Strong Q.C. last May 26th for damage to the Soldier's Memorial in Summerside, the appeal was dismissed as Gallant pleaded guilty to the charge, but the sentence was mitigated, to a one year suspended sentence on condition that he and his father enter into a recognizance with the court to have the youth keep the peace for one year. He was also ordered to pay damages fixed at \$25.00.

Two character witnesses, Mrs. Irene Easton, the boy's school teacher, and Mayor of Borden Willard Leard attested to the boy's deportment.

Mrs. Easton said he was one of the best students she ever taught and had known him for three years. She stated that his attendance at school was excellent, that he maintained a high standing in grades, was ambitious and never caused any trouble in any way.

Mayor Leard read a letter to the court signed by himself and the Borden Town Council vouching for the youth's good behaviour and high standing in the community. Robert himself told the court that he and two other youths were playing around and on the monument and the sword had been broken off when they tried to straighten it out after it had been bent when he was pushed against it. He said one of the other boys threw the broken portion of the sword through a window in a nearby building.

His Honor Mr. Justice Tweedy told the youth that the sacrifice of the monument represents is very great indeed and that he did great damage even in fun. He said he trusted the youth appreciates the seriousness of the offense committed and that he was fortunate in having his teacher, the Mayor and Town Council to attest to his deportment.

The appeal of Gordon Sullivan of Summerside against a conviction for driving while his ability was impaired was adjourned until October 21st.
