

3RD BATTALION PRINCESS PATS TAKES OVER IN KOREA

Rival Factions Clash In Street Brawl In London

Red And Fascist Movements Said To Be Involved

LONDON, Nov. 9 (AP)—A Red revolution celebration attended by the Red Dean of Canterbury and a counter-demonstration by the British Union Movement touched off a street brawl in London Saturday night.

The union movement is the post-war revival of the Hitler-loving organization founded by Sir Oswald Mosley.

The rival demonstrations were in widely separated parts of London. Top Iron Curtain country diplomats assigned to London were at the rally celebrating the Russian revolution anniversary, along with the Red Dean, who was loudly applauded for his pro-Soviet speech.

Communists and anti-fascist Britons clashed with Union Movement members for about 15 minutes at the counter-rally, but heckling continued for an hour.

The factions fought with rotten apples, stones, fireworks and fists before the battle was brought under control. No serious injuries were reported.

Mounted police and truckloads of reserves rushed to the scene of battle in Northeast London.

The British Union Movement demonstrators sang the Horst Wessel, theme song of Nazi Germany.

LONDON—(CP)—An anonymous donor has given £70,000 to the National Trust "for the preservation of beautiful and historical buildings." This is the biggest single gift the trust has received.

President Of C. I. O. And United Steelworkers Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9 (CP)—Philip Murray, president of the C. I. O. and United Steelworkers of America, died early today of a heart attack. He was 66.

Death of the white-haired, gentle-voiced Scotman removed one of the "Big Three" of United States labor. The two others are John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, and William Green, president of the A. F. L. All three were coal miners together in the U.M.W. at one time.

Murray retired at the Mark Hopkins Hotel about midnight, shortly after addressing a western regional conference of the steelworkers. His wife arose at 6:45 A.M. and found him collapsed on the floor beside the bed. A doctor pronounced him dead 20 minutes later.

Immediate speculation as to Murray's successor as C. I. O. head centers around Allen S. Haywood, C. I. O. executive vice-president, and Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers.

Reuther probably can have the job if he wants it, keeping the presidency of the U. A. W. at the same time. But he might feel two such jobs would be too great a task.

A third possible successor is Joseph Curran, swashbuckling president of the National Maritime Union.

Murray, a native of Biantyre, Scotland, came to the U. S. in 1902.

Conway Child Fatally Burned At Her Home

Linda Fay Palmer, 3 1/2-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Palmer, Conway, died in the Prince County Hospital in Summerside on Saturday as the result of burns suffered at her home on Friday.

The little girl had been playing upstairs in her home about 2 p.m. on Friday afternoon when her mother heard her cries and rushed upstairs to find the little girl enveloped in flames from her clothing.

It is believed she had found matches which she ignited.

The mother is said to have suffered burns about the arms in trying to extinguish the flames in her young daughter's clothing.

The little girl was rushed to the Prince County Hospital but was burned so extensively that she died about noon on Saturday.

Besides her sorrowing parents she leaves to mourn the following brothers and sisters: Erland, Laurence, and Arlene, in Halifax; Wallace, in Summerside; and Fenton, Darrell, Walter, Dorothy, Kathleen, and Lillian, in Conway.

Funeral service will be held at her home on Tuesday, November 11, at 11 a.m., with interment in Freeland cemetery.—S.

Mme. Casgrain Re-Elected To Head C. C. F. In Quebec

MONTREAL, Nov. 9 (CP)—The two-day annual convention of the Quebec section of the C. C. F. wound up today with re-election of Mme. Therese Casgrain as leader of the party for another year.

Georges St. Amour of Bedford, Que., was re-elected provincial vice-president and Squire Blackshaw of Montreal was appointed provincial treasurer. Macques V. Morin and William Dodge were re-elected vice-presidents.

Principal decisions made were adoption of demands for immediate construction of a subway for Montreal with the financial assistance of the Provincial and Federal Government; establishment of a \$50,000,000 housing fund immediately to alleviate the housing shortage; a bill of rights, a fair employment practices act and support for a federal-provincial health plan.

The party decided to contest at least 40 seats in the next federal election.

A resolution adopted Saturday protested Premier Duplessis' announcement that an individual obtaining a conviction of a person violating margarine laws will receive half the fine imposed.

1st Battalion En Route Home; Front Quiet

WITH THE CANADIANS IN KOREA, Nov. 9 (CP)—The 1st Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, hauled down its battle flag today and within seconds the pennant of the P.P.-C.L.I.'s 3rd Battalion replaced it at the masthead. The brief ceremony symbolized the turnover of bound 1st Battalion to the 3rd, newly arrived in Korea.

Maj.-Gen. M. A. R. West, commander of the Commonwealth Division, witnessed the parade and stayed to attend the impressive playing of retreat by a composite band from both battalions under Drum-Major Jock MacKie of Calgary.

Final ceremony by the 1st Battalion before departure from Korea will be a memorial service Nov. 12 for their comrades in the United Nations cemetery at Pusan.

Canadian soldiers throughout Korea held special church parades today in observance of Remembrance Day. They wore poppies sent by the British Legion.

LITTLE ACTION

SEOUL, Nov. 10 (Monday) (AP)—The Korean war slackened Sunday to its quietest level in more than a month. Only minor probes and patrols were reported along the freezing 155-mile front.

Light snow whitened the western valleys and blanketed the rugged eastern mountains as the third winter of war began.

Three Decorated

SEOUL, Nov. 10 (Monday) (Reuters)—Two officers and a sergeant of the Royal Canadian Regiment have been decorated for their action Oct. 23 when the Chinese assaulted Little Gibraltar Hill, the British Commonwealth Division announced last night.

They are Capt. Herbert George Cloutier of Barrie, Ont., and Lieut. John Clark of Beebe, Que., both of whom won Military Crosses, and Sgt. Gerald Emerson Peter Enright of Billings, Bridgton, Ont., who won the Military Medal.

Clark was commander of a platoon in B Company which took the Communist attack. Enright was his sergeant. Cloutier was commander of E Company, which held B Company's flank.

The Citations

The citation said Clark assisted casualties over open ground during a Communist barrage and then returned to fight, throwing grenades and manning a rifle and machine-gun until the ammunition was expended.

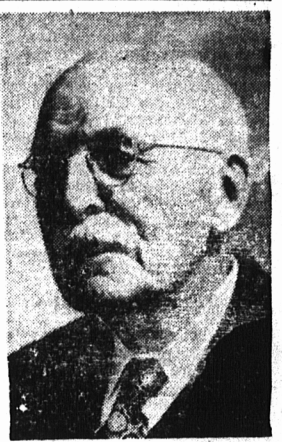

Renowned Canadian Scholar Dies

TORONTO, Nov. 9 (CP)—Dr. Harold Adams Innis, 58, internationally renowned Canadian economic historian, died Saturday.

Known to scholars of the social sciences throughout the world as "Innis of Toronto," he was head of the department of political economy at the University of Toronto and dean of the School of Graduate Studies. His several books were widely read outside of this country despite the fact they dealt strictly with Canadian economics.

Born in Ottaville, Ont., educated at Woodstock (Ont.), Collegiate and a graduate of McMaster University, Hamilton, Prof. Innis also attended the Universities of Chicago, New Brunswick, Manitoba and McMaster, Laval and Glasgow.

Prof. Innis is survived by his widow, the former Mary Quayle of Wilmette, Ill., also a noted Canadian scholar, historian and author of several books on economic history in Canada; two sons, Donald and Hugh, and two daughters, Mrs. Bruce Cates of Vancouver and Anne Christine.

Senator Lodge Gets Nod For Important Role

AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 9 (AP)—President-elect Dwight D. Eisenhower today named Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts as his pre-inauguration representative in the Defence and State Departments and other federal agencies.

Eisenhower notified President Truman that Lodge will serve as his liaison man in all federal agencies, except the Budget Bureau, where such liaison "may prove useful facilitating the transfer of public business from the old to the new administration."

As his representative in the Budget Bureau Eisenhower appointed Joseph M. Dodge, Detroit banker.

Lodge, defeated for re-election last Tuesday, managed Eisenhower's pre-convention campaign and was chairman of the General's campaign advisory committee during the campaign. He has been widely mentioned for a cabinet post.

Dodge in addition to being president of the Detroit bank is a director of the Chrysler Corporation, the Standard Accident Insurance Company, the Planet Insurance Company, and a trustee of the Equitable Life Insurance Company of Iowa.

Both Lodge and Dodge sat in a conference with Eisenhower at his vacation retreat here today before announcement of their appointments.

Lodge has been mentioned for both secretary of defence and secretary of state, and there also has been talk of an ambassadorship.

'Quake In San Francisco Area

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9 (AP)—An earthquake, described as "strong" shook parts of the San Francisco Bay area about 11:50 a.m. PST Saturday.

The quake was reported by residents in San Francisco, Oakland and in Marin County, to the north.



HALIFAX, Nov. 9 (CP)—Official forecasts issued tonight by the Dominion Public Weather Office here and valid until midnight Monday.

Rain and snow have spread rapidly eastward to Western Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in advance of two disturbances, one near Ottawa and the other which formed along the New England coast during the evening. The rain and snow will spread to the remainder of the Maritimes during the night and will end on Monday as these disturbances cross the district. The snow will change to rain in the Southern Maritimes but many localities in New Brunswick can expect from two to four inches of snow.

Israel's First President Dies From Heart Attack

REHOVOT, Israel, Nov. 9 (AP)—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, first president of Israel and renowned chemist, died of a heart attack early today.

Announcement of the death of the 77-year-old "Father of Israel" after a prolonged illness plunged this newly-born desert nation into deepest mourning. All places of entertainment were closed and memorial meetings were arranged throughout the country.

Premier David Ben-Gurion quickly called his cabinet into session and eulogized the great statesman of Zionism who from boyhood dreamed and planned a new Jewish homeland. The cabinet decreed that all work stop Tuesday the day of the state funeral.

Israel soldiers lined the roadway leading to the Weizmann mansion where workmen began constructing a canopy catalogue in front of the residence.

The nation learned of his death at 7:20 A.M. by a special broadcast from the Jerusalem radio station, the "Voice of Israel." All entertain-

ment broadcasts were cancelled until after the funeral.

Dr. Weizmann dreamed his great dream of a Jewish homeland as a boy in Russia, where he was born near Pinsk, Nov. 27, 1874, was of 12 children.

The Jewish state was born in 1948 when Great Britain surrendered her 25-year mandate over Palestine. It was the first Hebrew nation in 2,000 years.

Dr. Weizmann, who became a naturalized citizen of Britain in 1910, was one of the great chemists of his time. In the critical days of the First World War he discovered a way to produce synthetic acetone, chemical needed for the manufacture of explosives.

This and other services in the field of chemistry which helped the Allies win that war were said to have been a factor in bringing about the Balfour declaration of 1917 by which British support was pledged to the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people. The British foreign minister was Arthur J. Balfour.
