Our Fishing Interests.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 17. Capt. Blake, of the Gloucester seiner Andrew Burnham, says that American fishermen cannot do without the privileges of Canadian waters, and they are beginning to realize the necessity for a renewal of the fishery treaty at any price.

A large fleet of American mackerel men are heading for the North Bay of P. E. I. It is reported that the Dominion officials have issued new instructions to local officials and that the extreme provisions of the treaty will not be harshly enforced for the present, in the hopes of promptly getting a commission to settle the whole question; but the Imperial Government thoroughly understands that if the commission project fails Canada will vigorously enforce her fishery rights, or no treaty.

Methodist Conferences. AMHERST, June 17. The Nova Scotia Conference of the Methodist Church has elected the Rev. Cranswick Jost, Secretary.

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 17. Dr. Stewart has been elected President of the New Brunswick Conference. General Superintendent Williams is present.

Both Conferences report gains in membership and finances. They will hold grand union meetings.

Looking to Retaliation. WASHINGTON, June 17. In the Senate yesterday, Senator Dawes, of Massachusetts, introduced a bill authorizing the President, whenever he feels satisfied that American vessels are denied commercial privileges in any foreign port, to issue a proclamation prohibiting vessels of that country or port from exercising such commercial privileges as he may define, under the penalty of forfeiture.

A Brightening Outlook. MONTREAL, June 17. General Manager Hague of the Merchants Bank of Canada says that the commercial depression has lifted and that trade prospects are very bright.

Opening of the Campaign. LONDON, June 17. Gladstone will open the campaign to-morrow by a great speech.

EDINBURGH, June 17. Irish Nationalists will hold a great convention at Dublin, and issue an address to the Irish voters of the Kingdom.
