

Transportation Is Big Problem For Montreal

MONTEAL, CP—In Montreal, one of the world's great transportation centres, transportation remains one of the main problems to be licked before the 1967 world's fair. As things stand now, getting to the twin-island site on the St. Lawrence River is an extremely tough proposition for any group larger than the usual Sunday-afternoon crowd. However, planners say a subway line under the river, some superhighways, another bridge or two and a monorail system are all that are needed to solve the problem of access to the fair grounds and circulation around their 600 acres. As a matter of fact, all these things are planned in time for the fair. But, with opening day, April 26, 1967, barely 1,000 days away, most of them are acutely off the drawing boards. Tenders for the first section of the three-mile subway line under the river linking downtown Montreal with the fair grounds and the south shore will be called next week. Lucien L'Allier, city public works director, said actual construction should begin in June and the line is to be finished by March 1967. The rest of Montreal's 14-mile subway system is to open by July 1968.
