**Anyone Said Able For Math If Proper Approach Is Used**

WOLFVILLE, N.S. (CP)—Mathematics holds more people back from a college education than any other subject. This is a ridiculous state of affairs, says Charles Best of Acadia University here.

"Everybody can't be a mathematician," said Mr. Best, currently working toward his master's degree in the subject. "But anyone can do math if they are taught to approach it in the proper way."

It's the same old math but now it's "taught with understanding." There is a growing interest in "pure math" designed primarily to aid and develop the ability to reason.

As part of the work toward his degree here he devised the new mathematics text Linear Algebra and Vector Spaces by Acadia mathematics professor Ralph L. Jeffery.

The book, says Mr. Best, is in line with the trend toward educating the whole person. If taught well and properly it is more purposeful and much closer to what was originally intended to be the function of mathematics.
