House of Assembly.

SATURDAY, April 23.  
The Leader of the Opposition presented the petition of members of the City Council for changes in the bill to amend the Water Commissioners' Act. The petition was received and read. The bill authorizes the sale of lands in Princetown and Princetown Common was read a third time and passed. Amendments made by the Legislative Council to the Medical Bill were considered in committee—with open doors—and passed. The bill respecting the sale of intoxicating liquors in Charlottetown was read a third time and passed. The bill to incorporate the Farmers Trading Association of Three Rivers was read a third time and passed. The bill to incorporate the Central Mutual Fire Insurance Company was read a third time and passed. Mr. H. C. McDonald submitted a bill to incorporate the Union Dairyman's Association of Lots 49 and 50. Read a first time. The bill to amend the County Courts Amendment Act, 1878, was read a second time, committed and agreed to without amendment. House adjourned till 10 o'clock on Monday.

**A Grievance.**  
To the Editor of the Guardian:  
Sir,—I wish to insert a few lines in your paper concerning my schooner "Olivia," which sank at McAuley's Wharf, Pinette, last August, with a cargo of 60 poses of coal. Being compelled by the Marine Department to take her out of the way I had to sell her for \$25, as I had no means at my disposal. I was advised by one of the members of the Government to petition the Lieutenant Governor in Council last year, and I did so. I had one hundred names to that petition, and if necessary I could have got one thousand. As the Government is in session now, I want to inform them how I lost the vessel. I hauled in and made fast to the wharf as far up as I could get her; at high water at her bow was six feet of water, while at her stern was fifteen feet, and at low water she broke all fasts and slipped into the channel and sank. The end of the wharf was still worse, as the channel runs at an angle to the southeast corner. As the wharf is a Government wharf they should not allow a poor man to lose his property, all on account of the place not being dredged. The wharf is very convenient for the farmers of Point Prim and vicinity, but the channel wants to be dredged. Hoping that the hon. Neil McLeod will bring this matter before the house, and that hon. Mr. Peters and his party will have no objection to doing something in my favor, as it would not be much of a burden on the Province to give me a little help.
