### NOTES AND COMMENTS

—Has Majuba been avenged? —The western side of the Boer invasion has been broken; now for the eastern side. —Dr. Lyda, who said the Boers would ask \$10,000,000 as ransom for Cecil Rhodes, asked his horse before he had caught it. —The position of the Lord Governor is similar to what General Cronjé's was. As Brother Nash of the Patriot would say, it has three "S." before it, viz: "Survival, Stermination or Surrender."

—The Military Gazette has published a rumor that of Lake has been elected a successor Major-General Hutton, and that the British officer is sailing immediately for Canada. —The exports from Cape Colony during the month of January were of the value of £251,182, against £2,312,114 in the corresponding month of last year. The decrease is due to the stoppage of the shipment of gold and diamonds.

—It is stated that an American company has been formed to complete the Panama canal. The capital will be £24,000,000. On the other hand, the Nicaraguan Government has granted a concession to Messrs. Byre and Cragin to make a canal through Nicaragua, and there is also a Maritime Canal company of Nicaragua. Moreover, there is a party trying to get the United States government to make a canal through that state. Meanwhile, the Panama canal remains unfinished.
