YOUNG MEN, VOTE EARLY FOR POPE AND BRECKEN.

LEASHER DROWNED.—James McNab, of this Island, was drowned at St. George's, N. B., on Thursday last.

COURT CASES.—The County Court will commence its sittings in Charlottetown on Thursday next—Election day. There are about ninety suits on the docket.

DOMINION GOLD.—Messrs. Rankin & Beattie have recently shipped a considerable quantity of gold dust, obtained from Ontario, to Europe, as a sample to be tested.

MR. L. C. HALL landed two horse mackerel here last week that he caught in a trap at Cape George. The largest one weighed 700 lbs., and the other 300 lbs.—Advertiser.

REPORTED ROBBERY.—It is reported that the Maritime Bank of St. John was last week, robbed of \$30,000, and that the robbery was committed while Barnum's Show was passing.

SET ON FIRE BY LIGHTNING.—On Monday night last, during the thunder storm a barn belonging to Mr. John Macaulay, Black Bush, was struck by lightning and set on fire. One of the neighbors, hearing an unusual crashing noise, was attracted to the spot and hastened to give alarm, which was very fortunate, as it was with much difficulty they succeeded in saving his dwelling house. Mr. Macaulay has met a very heavy loss, as a good barn, a large quantity of hay, wagons and sleighs, and all his farming implements were consumed.—Advertiser.

A SPECTACLE.—The advisability of having a car upon the railway wharf at Summerside, ready to take through passengers from the steamer to the railway station cannot, we think, be doubted. Strangers whose object in coming here is to obtain rest and pleasure, are very apt to be disgusted at first sight, if they are obliged to trudge up a long dusty wharf under a broiling sun. In the interests of the Province, and of the railway, we beg to suggest (if it can be managed) to our obliging railway Superintendent the propriety of having a car ready to meet the steamer on the railway wharf at Summerside.

GRAND LODGE OF OBEDELLIANS.—The Grand Lodge of Independent Order of Obedellians, of the Maritime Provinces, commenced its annual meeting at Fredericton, N. B., on Tuesday last. The report of the Secretary showed that 450 initiations had taken place during the year, 4 reinstatements and 34 admissions by card. The present membership is 1638, the increase during the year—deducting withdrawals, deaths and suspensions—having been 275, or fully twenty per cent. There was paid for relief during the year \$1108; to widowed families, 192.50, and for burying the dead \$338.70. The receipts of the year amounted to \$8230, and the present assets of the lodges to \$12,850. At the closing session yesterday the officers were elected for the ensuing year.

ROMANIZE THE MAILS.—There has been something wrong in the St. John Post Office for some time, something that was not at all remedied by the change made in the head of the office. Complaints about money being missing have been coming in for months, and the officials have been puzzled to account for the thefts. Inspector Dew has blamed the St. John office all along, leaving as our readers know, dismissed one clerk on bare suspicion. But the losses continue after that dismissal. A marked feature of recent thefts was the taking of part of the money in the letters operated on. The letter would be received, and show no signs of having been tampered with, and yet part of the money that had been enclosed would be missing. Some time ago letters were found in the pocket of an old overcoat belonging to one of the junior clerks, Samuel Leonard Tilley Rankin, son of Deputy Sheriff Rankin; but as the coat had been used by several of the clerks, and it did not appear who had worn it last, the denial of its owner, who indignantly declared that the letters had been placed there by some enemy of his in the office, was accepted. But the losses continued, and the dismissal of the whole staff seemed to be the only effective remedy. Inspector Dew arrived the other day, and after quietly studying the case, became suspicious of young Rankin. A St. George letter being opened and half its contents abstracted last week, a decoy letter, containing \$25.50 in marked bank notes, and silver, was sent to the St. George Postmaster on Saturday, that official being instructed to send it back to the same address that the letter which had been tampered with came to. The letter arrived yesterday, was duly received by the gentleman to whom it was addressed, and when opened, was found to contain but \$16.50. Young Rankin was immediately given into custody, the arrest being made by Sergeant Hayes and Officer Weatherhead, and the missing money was found in his pocket. He was taken to the Police Station and locked up in the Chief's room, and C. W. Weldon, Esq., Deputy Minister of Justice, made acquainted with the facts. The preliminary examination will, probably, take place in the Police Court this morning. The inspector says that fully \$500 had been stolen from letters passing through the St. John office during the last year. Rankin is about nineteen years old, and has been always considered a model youth. He has had the benefit of the most emulating home influences, having had the instructions and example of a father who values his good name more than all the wealth of the world, and the loving care of mother and sister. His salary was sufficient for all his wants, he was not suspected of having any expensive habits, and yet he has fallen—has plunged father, mother, brothers, and sisters into greater grief than they would have experienced if he had been carried home a corpse—and all for the sake of a few dollars. Mr. Rankin visited the Police Station last evening, and every one who saw him was touched to the heart by the signs of grief in his face. The family have the sincere sympathy of the whole community.—St. John News.

AFRICA.—A letter from Stanley, the African explorer states that he had a battle with the natives in which their loss was very great. Forty-two were counted on the field dead, and over one hundred were seen to retire wounded, while on Stanley's side only two men suffered by contusions.

THUNDER STORM.—On Monday evening last the most terrific storm of thunder, lightning and rain passed over this town that has been known for many years. The lightning struck in several places and persons received shocks in different parts of the village, but happily no lives were lost. The electric fluid entered the Bayview House, the residence of James McDonald, Esq., and shattered the corner of the building from the upper story to the ground. Hon. H. F. Perley, Chief Engineer of the Dominion, was standing within about four feet of the window on the second floor and escaped unhurt. In the lower room Mr. James McArthur was prostrated by a stroke through a window near which he was standing, paralyzing one of his legs and slightly stunning him, while the apartment was filled with a sulphurous smoke. All present received a slight concussion but otherwise were unharmed. Among the occupants at the time were W. R. Watson, Esq., High Sheriff of Queen's County; Messrs. A. W. Owen and G. W. Gutter, of Charlottetown; Capt. P. Graham, of New Glasgow, N. S.; Mr. W. Taylor and lady, and the two Misses Boer of this place. In the adjoining dwelling occupied by Mr. G. C. Carlton, the lightning entered the front door and passed through the hall. The end of a building in the rear was riddled as if with shot. Mrs. D. Boston, Miss J. McDonald and Miss Carlton were in the act of coming out of the house when the former received a sharp stinging blow on the bridge of her nose which cut the skin and caused the blood to flow profusely during the greater portion of the night. Miss McDonald escaped without a touch, but Miss Carlton received a portion of the blow on the forehead that caused a dizziness which continued all the following day. A child of Mr. Henry Jenkins, who resides in the new hotel was paralyzed and remained so for some time. Different persons experienced shocks causing nausea and headache, but no further bad effects followed. We are glad to be able to announce that those who were injured are recovering.—Souris Times.

During the recent hot weather in England the bathing accidents so seriously increased that the Royal Humane Society has issued and widely circulated directions to bathers. As mischiefs frequently result from injudicious bathing in this Island, we quote the rules here—Avoid bathing within two hours after a meal, or when exhausted by fatigue or any other cause, or when the body is cooling after perspiration, and avoid bathing together in the open air, after having been for a short time in the water, there is a sense of chilliness with numbness of the hands and feet; but bathe when the body is warm, provided no time is lost in getting into the water. Avoid chilling the body by sitting or standing undressed on the bank or in boats after having been in the water or remaining too long in the water. Leave the water immediately there is the slightest feeling of chilliness. The vigorous and strong may bathe early in the morning on an empty stomach, but the young and the weak had better bathe two or three hours after a meal; the best time for such is two or three hours after breakfast. Those who are subject to attacks of giddiness or faintness, and those who suffer from palpitation or other sense of discomfort at the heart, should not bathe without first consulting their medical adviser.
