Legislative Council Election.

CONVENTION AT SOURIS—NOMINATION OF HON. SIMON BOLGER.

A CONVENTION met on Saturday evening, the 28th inst., at the Bay View Hotel, Souris East, to take into consideration the nomination of a fit and proper person to represent the First Electoral District in the Legislative Council.

Souris and the adjacent settlements were fairly represented.

E. B. MUTTART, M. D., first addressed the meeting. In a few brief, but well chosen words, he complimented the Hon. Mr. Bolger after eight years of public service in the Legislative Council, coming before the electors again for re-election with clean hands.

HON. MR. BOLGER next addressed the meeting. He gave an account of his stewardship while in the Council; and said his sole aim in again appearing before the people for re-election, was the abolition of the Council; and, judging from letters he had received from certain leading men in various parts of the District, his election was sure.

JOHN McLEAN, M. P. P., addressed the meeting. Mr. McLean in a brief and easy manner expressed his opinion that Mr. Bolger was one of the most consistent members ever returned to the Legislative Council, in as much as he always guarded the interests of the country, and fought for the abolition of the Council, and is still imbued with the same principles.

JAMES LESLIE, Souris West, addressed the meeting. Mr. Leslie highly approved of the conduct of Mr. Bolger while in the Council, and considers him a fit and proper person to represent the District in the Legislative Council, and is therefore worthy of his support.

JOHN CANTWELL also addressed the meeting. He highly approved of Mr. Bolger as a representative in the Council Chamber, and that the interests of the people are in safe hands while intrusted to Mr. Bolger, therefore he considers him worthy of his support, and believes Mr. Bolger will receive a solid vote in Souris West.

J. G. STERN and Mr. McWade expressed themselves highly pleased with the past conduct of Mr. Bolger, while in the Council, and promised him their warmest support for re-election.

SUPREME COURT.—The Court this morning unanimously confirmed the judgement of Messrs Hayden and Heard in the seduction case tried yesterday and dismissed the appeal with costs. We note with satisfaction that the full Bench heard this appeal, and hope that in future appeals of all kinds will be dealt with in the same way.

A BIG sale of raw sugar took place at Montreal on the 27th ult. It composed three cargoes of Trinidad—about 1,000 hogsheads. The price was 5.08, which shows a loss of \$15,000 on the original cost. The Gazette says: The sale of this lot of sugar is quite a relief to the market, as it has been held here for sale all through the summer.

At a meeting of the Civil Railway Committee on the Canada Pacific Railway depot, on the 5th, it was determined to stipulate for a certain sum to be expended upon the passenger depot, and that the locomotives for the whole line of the Canada Pacific and the cars for the eastern section should be built in Montreal in case the city gives the Syndicate the conditions asked for. It was also determined to bind the Company to complete their works within eighteen months from May, 1883.

OVER ten thousand bags of raw sugar arrived in St. John from Bahia on the 30th ult. It was for the St. Lawrence Sugar Refinery, Montreal.

The old slave market of Zanzibar, where 30,000 slaves were formerly sold annually, has been transformed into mission premises, with a church and school.

Of the 120,000,000 women and girls in India, not more than one in every twelve hundred has yet been placed under any kind of Christian influence.

WE are requested by the Superintendent of Education to state that Tanner's First Principles of Agriculture, is adopted as a text book in the Public Schools of this Province.

THE new steamship "Villa de Ceara" will sail from Halifax November 10th, for St. Thomas, W. I., and all ports of Brazil. She has splendid passenger and freight accommodation.

IN Montreal, the other day, a cart's horse bit off the owner's nose in front of Notre Dame Hospital. The carter entered the hospital and had the fragments sewed on again.

A COUPLE named Macdonald from Glengarry, Ontario, visited Ottawa on the 30th ult; the old man has seen 105 years and his better half 108 summers. They are both hale and healthy.

EDWARD H. ELLIS was tried in St. John last week for living with another man's wife. Ellis is an Evangelist. Judge Waters sentenced him to pay a fine of \$400 or be imprisoned for two years.

ANGUST SEIG, the hero who periled his life to save the lives of 600 passengers in an attempt to stop the engine of his train when the cab was on fire, died at St. Francis Hospital, N. Y., on Friday night. He leaves a wife and five children in Philadelphia.

THE loss by the burning of the Park Theatre, New York, is estimated at \$250,000. Mr. Abbey loses \$100,000, and his insurance amounts to \$150,500. He has arranged to open the Grand Opera House next Monday, when Mrs. Langtry will appear.

AT Victoria, B. C., a man had accumulated through a small business a fortune of a few thousand dollars. His wife concealed the money in a place known only to herself. Last week she died suddenly, and the strictest search has failed to reveal the place of deposit. A local paper says: "The husband is distracted in consequence of his double loss."

A NUMBER of convicts, working in the Cowell tunnel, near Waynesville, N. C., on Wednesday evening, unearthed the skeleton of a mastodon, six feet beneath the surface, in a perfect state of preservation. All the bones of the monster, which had been about 40 feet in length, have been secured. They crumbled somewhat on exposure. Masses of red marble lay above the skeleton.

THE case of Wilkinson vs. Rev. Henry Ward Beecher for \$10,000 claimed to have been paid the defendant by the plaintiff under a contract made with the firm of Ford & Co., of which Wilkinson was a co-partner, to write for them the "Life of Christ," was on the calendar of the Court on Friday, but owing to it being the last day of the term, and there being every probability that the case would occupy several days, was set down for November 6th.

ROBERT NUGENT, who figured in Halifax, some six or seven years ago as Lord Courtney, and was arrested for fraud, and also victimized the people of Newcastle, N. B., where he forged the name of the Bank of Montreal, has been arrested at Winnipeg for swindling under the alias of Fitzroy Somerset. In 1878 he was at Ottawa as Hon. Richard Westwara, was received at Government House and feeced several confiding parties. He has been under half a dozen aliases in Canada and the United States and been a very successful confidence man.

IRON.—Messrs. Frothingham & Workman, iron merchants, Montreal, have issued the following card to their customers notifying them of an advance in the prices which took effect last week: "Our last prices from England report a decided advance in the price of iron. Freight also has raised considerably, and will be still higher after close of river navigation. We are consequently compelled to put up our prices; and hereby give notice of an advance of twenty-five cents per 100 lbs., on all kinds of bar hoop and sheet iron, to take effect on the 27th inst."
