

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

CITY COURT—The City Court will meet tomorrow. There are a number of cases on the docket.

DIED LAST NIGHT—Mr. John Quinn, who met with the accident at Summerside on the evening of Thanksgiving Day, died last night about eleven o'clock. Mr. Quinn was fifty-five years of age, and was deservedly respected by all who knew him. His bereaved widow and family have our sympathy.

EPWORTH LEAGUE—At the meeting of the Epworth League of the First Methodist Church last evening Mrs. Mark Wright read a paper on "The Klondyke," and Mr. G. F. Beer a paper on "The School System of Prince Edward Island." Both papers were interesting and instructive, and were greatly appreciated. FAILURE OF FISHERIES—Owing to the failure of the fisheries in Cape Breton this year it is feared that many people especially along the northern and southern coasts will suffer this winter for want of food. The prices were very low and not for years have the fish been so scarce, particularly mackerel and summer herring. In some parts where they depended wholly on the fishing for their livelihood not enough for their own use have been caught. It is thought that the government will be called to aid the distressed fishermen.—North Sydney Herald.

THEATRICAL—The Boston Comedy Company closed its engagement last evening, presenting "The Lancashire Lass" to a fair audience. The different characters in the play were well acted, and the rendering throughout was greatly appreciated by those present. Before the last act Mr. Webber made a short speech, in the course of which he returned thanks for kindnesses accorded him since he began coming to Charlottetown upwards of twenty years ago, and referred to the fact that the welcome he today received was just as cordial and hearty as it was upon the occasion of his first visit. This, he believed, was because he had always kept faith with the public, and had never allowed anything to be said or done upon the stage that would be in the slightest degree improper in the drawing room. Mr. Webber also announced that he would play a return engagement next year. His remarks throughout were received with the closest attention, and at their conclusion the applause was general. REV. MR. FULLERTON'S LECTURE.

Mr. John A. Lawson, Superintendent of St. James' Sunday School, presided last evening on the occasion of the lecture delivered by Rev. T. F. Fullerton, in St. James Hall, and introduced the learned lecturer in a brief address. Rev. Mr. Fullerton's subject was "The Egyptian War" and it was handled throughout in a most instructive manner. Then he dealt with the rebellions of Mahomet Ali and Arabi Pasha, and gave the audience an excellent account of the troubles in that country. The lecture was made doubly interesting by the excellent views so capably projected by Mr. A. E. Morrison. There were about fifty of these views in all and they served to illustrate most forcibly the points made by the lecturer during his discourse. At the close of the lecture a number of comic views were thrown upon the canvas which were enjoyed by the little ones as well as by the children of a larger growth.
