'Bugs' Frequent Behind Curtain

OTTAWA (CP) - Several dozen listening devices have been discovered over the years in Canadian chanceries and embassies, personnel residences in Iron Curtain countries, the external affairs department said Wednesday.

This is a standard technique in chanceries and residences of a department spokesman in commenting on the U.S. revelation Tuesday that more than 40 microphones have been discovered in the last 15 years in the American Embassy in Moscow.

The external affairs department statement said: "As is well known, the installation of listening devices in chanceries and residences of an embassy personnel is a standard technique in Iron Curtain countries and over the years several dozen such devices have been discovered by the Canadian authorities in our chanceries and residences in various Eastern European countries."

The spokesman declined to name the countries. "A continuing vigilance is maintained in this field," he said.

FRIENDSHIP TREATY

ZANZIBAR (AP) - The new Republic of Tanganyika and Zanzibar has signed a treaty of friendship and mutual assistance with Communist East Germany. But the announcement by Vice-President Abeid Karume did not make clear whether the agreement also provided for diplomatic relations between East Germany and the united republic.
