New Tri-way Snow Plow Is Demonstrated Convincingly

What was described by a Department of Transport official as "the finest piece of snow fighting equipment he has ever seen" was demonstrated by the Provincial Department of Highways yesterday.

The demonstration was made for the convenience of the Transport Department who are anxious to compare the new equipment with that now in use in their Department.

The new tri-way plow which is mounted on a Walters truck, is one

of the newest additions to the Provincial Highway's snow fighting force. It is designed for high speed operation and when travelling between 15 and 30 miles per hour, completely removes the snow from the right of way into the adjacent fields.

The first demonstration was conducted at the Charlottetown Airport and in the afternoon the Transport officials saw the plow in operation on the highway.

Present for the demonstration were Messrs. W. H. Irving and Glen Bird of Moncton and Mr. Al

Reddick of Ottawa — all from the Department of Transport. Highway Minister J. George MacKay and Deputy Minister Gordon White watched the demonstration along with Mr. Bane, representative for Walters machinery.

During the afternoon demonstration a parked car was damaged when it was struck by flying lumps of snow. From this it would seem evident that car owners would be well advised to refrain from leaving their cars near the highway while snow removal is in progress.

campaign. From dawn the walled city was out of bounds to all servicemen except those on duty. Armed air force and military police were on guard at key points to enforce the ban.

The funeral service was held from Sunday, Jan. 22, service conducted by Rev. M. C. Currie. Pallbearers were Daniel Martin, Gavin Klossi today turned out for the funeral of a 22-year-old Greek Cypriot shot by troops during a riot in the village Monday.

British troops cordoned off the village to prevent people from surrounding areas going to the funeral.

Villagers heard Bishop Anthimos one of Cyprus' three senior bishops under Archbishop Makarios, declare over the body: "Your deaths strengthen the Cypriot people's fight against slavery. It is an eternal example of British barbarism."

The curfew in Nicosia was imposed Monday following Saturday's terrorist shooting of three Royal Air Force men in the city. Two of the men died and the third lies dangerously wounded in hospital.

These did their shopping hurriedly, with frequent glances over their shoulders.

SEEKS TWO TRENDS

"Livestock and farming programs, generally, seem to be tending in two directions towards a common level in the Maritimes. In mixed farming areas, some production emphasis seems to be developing.

"Areas that were highly specialized now are seeking, not diversification, but the development of one or more sidelines as a safeguard against disaster in the event of a crop or a market failure of a single product."

Nova Scotia Expert Suggests New Production Methods To Restore Livestock Industry

QUEBEC (CP)—A Nova Scotia expert said Tuesday the Maritimes are witnessing disturbing trends in the livestock industry and he proposed new production methods to put the situation right.

S. B. Williams, superintendent of the Dominion experimental farm at Nappan, N. S., spoke to the 36th annual meeting of the Canadian Meat Packers Council.

He listed three factors as primarily responsible for the ills of the industry:

1. Comparatively small farms.
2. The distances from manufacturing centres and feed supplies.
3. Sky-rocketing farm-labor costs.

Mr. Williams suggested that production technique be revised to increase the production of beef cattle. He said that marketing cattle as 2½-year-olds, off grass and with a minimum of grain, would increase production by about 25 per cent and bring about a superior product.

He listed three factors as primarily responsible for the ills of the industry:

1. Comparatively small farms.
2. The distances from manufacturing centres and feed supplies.
3. Sky-rocketing farm-labor costs.

F. A. Wiggins of Toronto, general produce manager for Canada Packers said Canada's high standard of living prevents any sizeable export of poultry products.

"We cannot find any country in the world that can afford to pay our prices and take our product regularly throughout the season," he said.

P. Labrecque, director of the livestock branch of the Quebec department of agriculture, said animal production provides more than 75 per cent of the Quebec farmer's cash income.
