New Soviet Program Seen Dangerous One

Comment in the Soviet press on the words of Stalin, just before and at the close of the recent Communist Party meeting, has dictated another long look at the Stalin texts. Re-reading of these texts and relating them to what the Soviet press says about them, bring into glaring relief a frightening prospect.

Particular attention is being paid to Stalin's instructions to Communists abroad. We begin to see that when the Communists speak of a "new program" and a "new type of party" for countries outside the Soviet orbit they mean this: a join-'em-and-wreck-'em program.

"If you wish to be patriots of your country," Stalin said to the foreign Communists, "If you wish to become the leading force of the nation," the Communists in free countries must defend such things as "Bourgeois - Democratic freedoms" and "national independence and national sovereignty."

This program is coming to the fore among the Communist parties in Western Europe and elsewhere now that Stalin has made it official.

The order is this: Identify the Communist Party with civil rights and guarantees of personal liberty. Become the champion of all individuals whose rights under free Western constitutions can be made to appear in jeopardy.

When the Communists do this, the Kremlin believes, they will manoeuvre civilized governments more and more into the appearance of denying such rights. Or they will identify Western democrats with the forces aligned against constitutional freedoms.

If it were not for the automobile the roads of this Island Province would still be the primitive, tree-lined trails of yesterday, muddy and rutty, half of the year and almost snowbound during the winter.

Some folk think we have too many roads for a small province. Others say these roads have cost too much. Some have been built faster than we could afford to pay for them; but when it comes to the question as to whether the good roads as a whole have paid in every way, there is little room for argument. Road taxes are high, but the old mud trails with their wooden bridges were still higher. Indeed, one would shudder at the price poor roads have cost the citizens of this Island.

I can speak from personal experience, for I have travelled most of them. Well I remember the long dreary 4-1 1/2 miles that lay between our farm and the nearest doctor. After a quarter of a century, I can recall every snow drift, and believe me there were lots of them in that road. Delivering a load of produce to the city occupied the better part of a day, and often when the market was best the road was worst.
