A GREAT MAIL ROBBERY.—A London, Eng., cablegram of Friday night says:—"The robbery of registered letters at Hatton Garden post office excites great interest. There is not the slightest clue to the perpetrators, as the robbery was very skillfully planned. The moment chosen was shortly after five p. m., when the mails were about to be despatched. The gas was turned off at the meter, probably by a confederate secreted in the cellar, and the thieves in the darkness and confusion among the crowd of people who were doing business, jumped over the counter and seized the mails. Nobody noticed their exit or in what vehicle they conveyed their booty."

Farming in England.

THE OLD COUNTRY UNABLE TO COMPETE WITH THE YOUNG DOMINION—OPINIONS OF A CANADIAN DELEGATE.

Mr. R. W. Gordon of Ouley Grosnuds, Rugby, England, who was a delegate to Canada a short time ago, has addressed a letter to Mr. John A. Donaldson, Dominion Immigration Agent in Toronto, on the subject of his experiences in Canada and at home. He says:—"I am 'thoroughly and quite entirely,' as the Irishman says, ashamed of myself for having been so long in assessing your kind letter of the 29th August. You will see I dated from my new abode, where I have lived since last December. I hold this farm on a yearly lease which expires September, 1882, unless I renew it before then. Your country appears to have been again more highly favoured than this—at least in respect to agriculture. This has been, indeed, a disastrous season; the worst, in my humble opinion, we have had. Doubtless you will reap a rich harvest of emigrants again in the spring. The Old Country has its attractions, and they are great, but its ability to compete with such new and vigorous countries as yours, for example, will yearly become more difficult, in fact, impossible. We are too crowded; it costs too much to keep us alive. Several of my acquaintances and friends have crossed since I returned, and all by my advice, and no doubt, in part, have gone West. I have not yet heard with what result. You will be aware that I bought 1,680 acres 18 miles west of Winnipeg before I left the country. In all probability unless we have a great change for the better I will add another to the train of emigrants for the Far West. Snow to-day in the centre of England is lying two inches deep, which augurs badly for another good season. The cost of keeping up stock, if this is another severe winter, will be simply ruinous. Hay is selling at 47 a ton, and straw of all kinds is very badly got. Roots in England good; in Scotland will stand very little eating, and cakes and feeding stuffs are rising rapidly."
