Latest by Telegraph

Cherbourg, July 27. The Empress Eugenie yesterday visited the United States Steamer Colorado, now lying in the harbor, and was received with all the honors befitting her exalted rank. At her approach salutes were fired and the yards manned.

Paris, July 28. On Saturday evening Admiral Farragut was received at a State Dinner by the Emperor Napoleon. The Dinner was especially given by the Emperor in honor of the American Admiral. Members of the Imperial Cabinet and the United States Minister, Gen. Dix, were among the invited guests.

Paris, July 28. The Monitor positively denies the truth of the statement that the Emperor Napoleon had sent a note to King William of Prussia, urging him to surrender the Danish district of North Schleswig to Denmark.

Berlin, July 28. Notwithstanding the official denial in the Monitor of Napoleon's note to the King of Prussia in regard to North Schleswig the semi-official Journal of Berlin continues to urge King William to repel the intrusion of the French Emperor in the political affairs of Germany.

St. Petersburg, July 28. The Emperor has issued a decree by which the whole territory of the Kingdom of the Russian Empire in Central Asia is constituted one government under the command of Gen. Kaufman.

Paris, July 29. The Monitor of this morning declares that the rumors of war which now prevail on the continent are without foundation. It says that the existing relations of France with all European powers are eminently peaceful.

It denies that the formation of new military camps is contemplated, and says the reserves of artillery and cavalry horses are to be sold to farmers in the departments.

London, July 29, noon. The sincerity of the repeated denials put forth in the Paris Monitor of the war reports now current in Europe is doubted here.

The London Times in its city article of this morning is of opinion that the alarm created by these warlike rumors will have the effect to check trade generally until next spring.

Vienna, July 29. It is denied that the Hungarian military organization known as Honvied's or National Guards, is to be re-established. Though several meetings of the Honvied's of 1848 have recently been held in Hungary with the object of effecting a re-organization, no action has yet been taken by either the Austrian or Hungarian Government to that end.

Montreal, July 28. The Grand Trunk Railroad Employees while holding a picnic at St. Hyacinthe on Saturday, were attacked by a parcel of rowdies from Griffin town. The Riot Act was read, and the Volunteers called out. The rowdies were fired upon, and several of them wounded. A woman was shot through the shoulder, and is in a very precarious condition. A number of arrests have been made. Gold 140.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

The following account of the recent Railway accident on the road between Shediac and Saint John, we copy from the Morning Telegraph:

PARTICULARS OF THE RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—On Thursday afternoon the down train was thrown from the track at Hayward's Siding near Anagance, owing to the displacement of the switch rail. The Engine ran about two hundred feet after leaving the rails, tearing up the track as it went, and then rolled down the embankment five or six feet in height, turning completely over. The three freight cars next the Engine were fatally destroyed, and three others more or less damaged. The passenger cars were not thrown from the track or injured in any way. The driver, Mr. J. H. Moore, who remained at his post, and was thrown under the Engine, had the small bone of his leg broken and was badly scalded by steam. The Fireman was thrown through the window of the cab but escaped unhurt. No one else was injured. It is supposed that the accident was caused by some malicious person, as the bolt had been removed from the switch and the switch rail shifted, while the target remained as if the switch was all right, so that the driver could not see it in time to save the train. The track has been repaired, and the trains were running as usual. The Railway Commissioners offer a reward of \$500 for the apprehension of the party who so maliciously interfered with the switch. It is stated that, some time ago, a similar attempt was made at this switch to destroy the train of the track, but the displacement of the bolt was observed by a young man who restored it to its proper place. Moore, the driver, exhibited great coolness and pluck under the circumstances—his conduct is generally commended. We hope to hear of his early recovery from the severe wounds from which he is suffering. Fortunately, Dr. Vail was on the train at the time, and took charge of Moore's wounds immediately. The English remains where it was bottom up. The value of the property destroyed is considerable, and had the accident occurred to the morning train (which travels without any freight cars attached), many lives must have been lost.
