In the matter of the application of Arthur J. B. Mellish for admission to study law, Mr. J. T. Mellish reads petition and affidavit of the applicant, and moves for an order of the court for the admission of the applicant to study law on production of his B. A. diploma.

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N. B. and P. E. Island Conference.

(Special Correspondence of The Examiner.) WEDNESDAY, June 25.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The most interesting work of this Session was the consideration of the work and character of the ministers who have died during the year. The first name was that of Rev. Robert Duncan, who at one time was stationed on the Pownal Circuit.

The next name was that of Dr. Pickard. An obituary was read by Rev. D. Chapman. It referred to the late minister's work for education. It spoke of him as being for many years the controlling power in the educational work of the Maritime Provinces.

This was held in the evening. The congregation was not large, but the meeting throughout was hopeful and helpful. Dr. Pope presided with much grace and effectiveness. Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. Shenton. Rev. G. M. Campbell then read the report and made a stirring address.

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 25.

Conference resumed at 9 a. m., with Dr. Sprague in the chair. Rev. Geo. Steel presented a report of the Supernumerary Ministers and Ministers' Widows' Fund. The receipts from the districts are as follows:

being an increase of \$29.86. The average per member is only 7 7/10 cents.

Rev. D. Chapman brought up his notice of motion that Rev. F. W. Moore be allowed the recommendation of P. E. Island that he be reinstated in the Conference.

The point of order was made that only those could be received into the Conference who presented themselves as candidates, or as ministers from another place, and Mr. Moore filled neither position.

Rev. A. D. Morton, who has been transferred to Newfoundland Conference, made a brief address, in which he referred to the progress of the Nova Scotia Conference during the year.

On motion of Rev. F. Allen, it was decided to memorialize Conference to so amend discipline that it shall hereafter read that the Stationing Committee shall consist of two ministerial representatives, both elected by district meeting.

The final draft of stations was then received. It was very noticeable how few changes there were from the first draft. The list of stations for the Island is as below:

Permission was given to employ as local preachers Messrs. Wm. Tennant, Wm. Marr, Wm. Buchanan, J. B. McConnell, E. Chapman and Geo. A. Sellar.

Conference then nominated as Governors for Mount Allison College Revs. J. Read, Dr. Pope and J. Shenton; and Messrs. Alex. Gibson, J. D. Chipman and W. E. Dawson.

Rev. E. Evans was elected Ministerial representative on the General Mission Board, Rev. C. H. Paisley on the Supernumerary Fund Committee and J. C. Irvine, Esq., as lay member.

After disposing of some routine business Conference adjourned. Throughout it was very pleasant and harmonious.
