QUE. HOCKEY LEAGUE CEASES TO OPERATE

Financial Losses Due To Transfer Trouble Given As Reason For Withdrawal

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 26—Quebec Senior Hockey League will not operate next season, it was announced yesterday by League President Gaven Power, following annual meeting of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association.

Financial loss which he said had been incurred by action of the parent body in throwing out early season games because players without transfer cards had participated, was the direct cause for the league "funeral march."

He urged the Q.A.H.A. to reconsider the transfer subject and "act more in the interest of the game than in the strict letter of the association bylaws."

"The Olympic situation" was described by James DeLalanne as the "immediate cause of my resignation from the presidency" of the Q.A.H.A.

Explaining the resignation of himself and Vice-President, George Slater last November, DeLalanne said he had been told that one hockey player was charging the Q.A.H.A. with being "front man for the Montreal Forum and they don't want Montreal Royals to represent Canada at the Olympics."

DeLalanne said he had been of the opinion the team to be chosen should have to show its strength.

"The Port Arthur Bear Cats," he said, "did not show they were a better team than Royals, and the Bear Cats were quite willing to play Royals if they had been so ordered."

But there was the impression, he said, that they were not permitted to play because if Royals had won it would have meant they would have been away several weeks from the Forum where they were providing good drawing cards.

When he and Slater learned of this impression, he concluded, they decided to retire.

Edward Sinclair, one of the youngest members of the body, who had been acting vice-president since the resignation of Slater, was elected president, to succeed Alcide Gagnon who filled in after DeLalanne resigned.

The meeting passed two resolutions declaring "it was an insult to French Canadians that no member of the race was represented on the Dominion Olympic hockey team," and that Canada "was humiliated by losing the Olympic title when the best team did not represent the Dominion." Both were passed without a dissenting vote.

Play For L. G. Lewis Badminton Trophy Opens In S'ide Friday Night

The City representatives are to be chosen from playing taking part in the recent City championships.

Cunningham, Lash Smash Middle Distance Records In Drake Relay Games

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DES MOINES, Iowa, April 26—Glenn Cunningham, the grand old man of foot racing, and Don Lash, Indiana University star, who may some day be Cunningham's rival, gave United States Olympic hopes a shot in the arm Saturday by racing to new American records in the Drake Relay Games.

Glenn won the 1,000 yard run in two minutes, 11.2 seconds. Cunningham, now a graduate student at the University of Iowa, ran a careful race to whip Harry Williamson of North Carolina by eight yards, and trim a full second off the old mark established in 1921 by Larry Brown of Pennsylvania.

Lash, setting his own pace all the way, sped to a new outdoor record for the two-mile run of nine minutes 10.6 seconds. There was no one else in the race after the first 100 yards, as the slender Hoosier set a dazzling pace to build up a huge margin. He turned on a steaming finish "kick" to come home a good 250 yards ahead of Wayne Slocum of Minnesota.

Lash's time shaved three seconds off the listed American mark of 9:13.6, established by Henry Brooksmith, in 1932.

Lash ran a dazzling final mile to help Indiana to a new Drake four-mile relay record of 17 minutes, 40.2 seconds. The old record was 17.45.

boys from the wide open spaces, gaining momentum for this year's Olympic drive, topped off their most successful invasion of the 42 year old Pennsylvania Relay Carnival last night in a record-smashing fashion.

Paced by the crack University of Texas sprint relay team, which scored two record-breaking victories in as many days, and by Ohio's redoubtable Jesse Owens in the individual competition, athletes from the mid-West and southwest dominated the meet.

The sensational negro breezed to victory over Sam Stoller of Michigan in the 100 metres invitation sprint by four feet, setting a new Carnival mark of 10.5 seconds, after equaling the old record of 10.6.

In the trials Owens was not hard-pressed in his other specialty and contented himself with clearly only 33 feet 5-8 inches to win the broad jump.

The day's most sparkling individual feat was registered by Charley Beetham, Ohio State half-mile, who stepped the anchor 880 in 1:52.2 to overhaul Manhattan and Michigan rivals and capture the two-mile relay title for the Buckeyes. Beetham started off in third place, fully 20 yards in the ruck, but overtook Burns of Manhattan and Drelsford of Michigan at the end of the backstretch.

Alton Terry, of Hurdin-Simmons College of Texas, got off a throw of 225.65 feet, the best achieved by an American in competition, to win the javelin event.

The University of Texas smooth-running combination of Reeves, Rockhold, Grunelsen and Wallender ran the less off Pennsylvania and Navy in the 890-yard relay. Their time, 1:26.8, clipped 1.5th second from the former Carnival mark. They lowered the meet mark for the 440 relay to 41.1 Friday.

German Team Advances To Second Round

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MADRID, April 26—Germany advanced to the second round of the European zone Davis Cup tennis competition today by winning the doubles match over the Spanish team for the third victory of their series.

Baron Gottfried Von Cramm and his partner, Lund, had little trouble defeating Enrique Maier and J. M. Blanc, 6-3, 6-3, 9-7, in the deciding match. Von Cramm and Heiner Henkel won the opening singles matches for Germany yesterday.

In the second round Germany will meet Hungary, which drew a first round bye.

Tulsa Team Still In Running

By Guardian's Special Wire) EDMONTON, April 26—Tulsa Stenos kept in the hunt for the women's international basketball championship when they defeated Edmonton Grads 40-33 in the third game of a best-of-three series here Saturday. The Grads, defending their laurels, won the first two games of the round and need one more victory to retain the title.

Arsenal Again Victorious In Cup Final

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 26—The extra touch of finesse that so often marks the difference between first and second English football league teams gave Arsenal supporters plenty to cheer about today.

In the English Cup final at Wembley Stadium yesterday, the Gunners' cleverness and experience finally told in a rousing battle with Sheffield United, plucky and youthful second division squad, and the Londoners scored the only goal of the game to win the trophy for the second time.

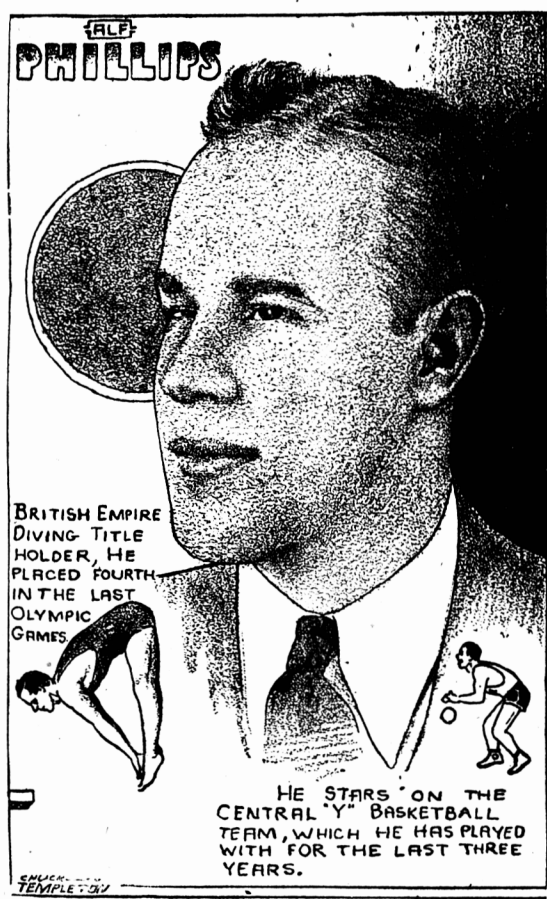

Gehrig And Foxx Both Hit Homers As Yankees Bat Out 12-9 Win Over Red Sox

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, April 26—Vic Sorrell, veteran, bespectacled member of the Detroit mound staff, held Chicago to five hits today as Chicago and the champion Tigers defeated the White Sox.

Sorrell allowed no hits for six innings as his mates were picking up two runs in the fourth and another pair in the fifth. The Bengals got another brace in the seventh to knock Johnny Whitehead from the hill.

Yanks Heavy Artillery In Action New York's heavy artillery drowned out the booming guns of Boston Red Sox and the Yankees took a free-scoring game by a 12-9 count at Boston. More than 12,000 attended.

Jimmy Foxx, Red Sox first sacker, and Lou Gehrig, who plays that position for the visitors, each slammed out homers. Foxx getting his fourth of the season in the first inning and scoring two runners ahead of him. Gehrig knocked out his second home run of this year in the second inning, likewise sending home two runners.

Newsom's Third Victory While Buck Newsom allowed Washington seven scattered hits, Washington playing at home, hepped on a trio of Athletic pitchers for 12 hits today to defeat the A's 11-3. It was Washington's second straight win over Philadelphia and Newsom's third victory of the year.

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, April 26—Lauri Myllykangas, Montreal right-hander, brought an end to the winning streak of Newark Bears at Newark today when he pitched the Royals to a 5-3 triumph in the second game of a doubleheader after the Bears had copped the first, 7-4, to run their string to 10 before 12,000 fans.

The Royals won in the final round on Hubert Bates' homer over the right field wall off Howard Laflamme. A single to infield and Schalk's error combined to give the victors an added tally.

Selection of Pirie was made after the delegates considered the recommendations to name Phyllis Dewar of Vancouver, Mary McConkey of Alberta and Connie Balmforth and Florence Humble, both of Montreal.

It was shown the Toronto youth had established five new records in the 200, 220 and 500 yards, and in the one mile free style events, and in the 80 yard free style relay.

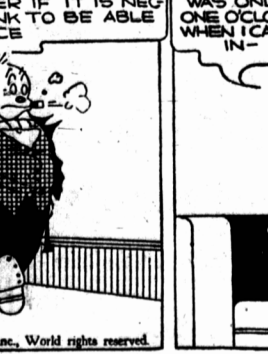
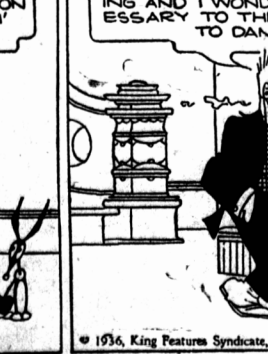
